- Formation is more than sharing information. Formation must transform our lives to reflect Gospel values, attitudes and perspectives



- to develop a understanding of the role that the OFS, and each Secular Franciscan, has in the Church and the Franciscan Family

The Ritual of the Secular Franciscan Order – Who are we? (Section 1)

■ "Many men and women, married and single, and many members of the diocesan clergy are called by God to follow the way of perfection of the gospel life after the example and manner of Francis of Assisi, to share his charism, and to make it present in the world. They promise to follow Jesus Christ and to live the gospel in fraternity by entering the Secular Franciscan Order. In this way they manifest the priceless gift of Baptism and realize it in a fuller and more fruitful way."

The first paragraph of the preface to the 1985 Ritual lets us know right off the bat that we are dealing with a very important document. The Ceremonies and Rites contained in the Ritual tell us who we are as Secular Franciscans through our actions and promises. Understanding the ceremonies and rites (before we make our life-long promises) is of equal (maybe greater) importance to all the things we learn in initial formation.

OFS Rites signify and effect the desire to become a member of the order and to make a permanent commitment to the Gospel Life. Particularly—

- ✓ Rite of Admission
- ✓ Rite of Profession

The rites celebrated in the formation of a Secular Franciscan <u>signify the</u> desire to become a member of the order and to make a permanent <u>commitment to the Gospel life.</u>

- The <u>Rite of Admission</u>, is the moment when we <u>become members of the order—We are attached to the Order although we have not yet made a permanent commitment. We wear the TAU and may write OFS after our name.</u>
- With the <u>Rite of Profession</u>, <u>we make our perpetual (life-long)</u> <u>commitment to live the Gospel life according to our Rule</u>
- Profession does not make us Secular Franciscans—it celebrates the commitment we make to live the Gospel life.

The celebration of <u>Profession</u> testifies to all of this, because it is God's action and a saving event: <u>it is a moment when salvation reaches the faithful:</u>

- 1. enabling them to make a promise to live the Franciscan gospel life and
- 2. producing in them <u>particular effects of grace</u>, by which they are called to specific tasks within the People of God.



"This aspect [the Rite of Profession] is by no means insignificant, because the celebration constitutes the foundational moment of the identity of the professed, and is simultaneously the condition for a dialogue to take place in response to God's action. In fact, the consequences of the commitment a human being expressed by means of a promise derive from a prior commitment, that of God to man." (Br. Felice Cangelosi OFM Cap)

A rite represents an ecclesiastical tradition about how the sacraments are to be celebrated. Rites are an intensification; they serve to strengthen the union of God and humankind. Rites are entrusted to the pastoral government of the Roman pontiff, the divinely appointed successor of St. Peter in the Primacy. Certain words cannot be changed.

A Rite is not about ceremony or looking good. The true meaning is about giving ourselves to God. We are called to bring God alive in who we are and how we live.

Who We Are Our Franciscan Identity and Heritage

The Rite of Admission begins with the Inquirers asking to enter the Secular Franciscan Order so that they may live more intensely and faithfully the grace of their Baptism. They seek to follow Jesus according to the teaching and example of St Francis and to be of service to all, as a secular person, for the glory of God.

ADMISSION

I ask to enter this fraternity of the Secular Franciscan Order, so that I may live more intensely and faithfully the grace and dedication of my Baptism by following Jesus Christ according to the teachings and example of St. Francis of Assisi. In this way I intend to be of service to all through my secular state of life for the glory of God and to fulfill his plan of love on behalf of all people.

Minister-perhaps with some appropriate gesture-says:

This fraternity is pleased to accept your request. I, therefore, receive you into the Secular Franciscan Order so that you may begin your time of formation and experience our Franciscan life in preparation for your permanent commitment.3

Why We Gather Life in fraternity and Sense of belonging

An example of <u>why we gather in fraternity</u> is found at the <u>end of the Rite of</u> Admission.

The minister says to the new candidates:

... [this] Secular Franciscan Fraternity ... very gladly promises to help you in your journey with friendship, prayer and the witness of its life.

<u>You, on the other hand, strengthen our fraternity</u> in numbers, by virtue of your presence and participation, and through the sharing of your special gifts. You are most welcome!

- 3. That's what it means to belong! Mutual love and support.

...to be admitted to profession of the Rule of
the Secular Franciscan Order and to make a permanent
commitment to the gospel life.

By faithfully living the articles of the Rule, they clothe themselves with our Franciscan identity and make it visible to the Church and to the world.

"Do you wish to embrace the gospel way of life by following the example and words of St. Francis of Assisi, which are at the heart of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order?"

It is also important to focus on the role of **symbols and gifts** in the ceremony of welcoming and in the Rites of Admission and Profession.

In each category we find

What we Internalize: the life of St. Francis; our Rule of Life; the Holy Gospels

Symbolic actions and gifts:

- We begin to get to know the aspirants through their introduction;
- the TAU cross is the sign of our Order in the United States and in many parts of the world because it was so important in Scripture and to St. Francis.
- A San Damiano Cross representing the humble Christ who spoke to St. Francis;
- the profession candle representing the light of Christ (recalling the baptismal candle);
- possibly a ring symbolizing eternal commitment.

Points to Remember

- † The rites and prayers in the Ritual are meant to be <u>celebrated publicly</u> in the midst of the fraternity. They are <u>not composed to be private</u> <u>devotionals</u>, although they do contain words of wisdom and spiritual depth.
- † <u>Advance preparation</u> and <u>focused intention</u> are vital for the celebrations to be meaningful.
- † When we gather for these occasions, <u>everyone is expected to be a</u> participant. No one is a spectator.
- † The most important point to remember is that when we gather, we are in the presence of **GOD**.

- T +Key Learnings: For you, what are the four most outstanding parts of the Rites of Admission and Profession?

The Holy Spirit has planted the seed of our vocation in us from the very beginning.
