Top Ten Messages of Laudato Si



Cry of the Earth / Cry of the Poor

- We have come to see ourselves as lords and masters, entitled to plunder her (the earth) at will. (2)
- A true ecological approach always becomes a social approach (49)
- * (We must) integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor. (49)

Franciscan Concern for Creation


- Saint Francis, faithful to Scripture, invites us to see nature as a magnificent book in which God speaks to us and grants us a glimpse of his infinite beauty and goodness.(12)
- * He (Saint Francis) shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace. (10)

What is Happening to Our Common Home?

- We cannot adequately combat environmental degradation unless we attend to causes related to human and social degradation. (48)
- The social dimensions of global change include the effects of technological innovations on employment, social exclusion, an inequitable distribution and consumption of energy and other services, social breakdown, increased violence and a rise in new forms of social aggression (46)

The Gospel of Creation

- We are not God. The earth was here before us and it has been given to us. (67)
- We are called to recognize that other living beings have a value of their own in God's eyes (69)



Franciscan Teaching on Creation


- Moreover they should respect all creatures, animate and inanimate, which "bear the imprint of the Most High" (OFS Rule 14)
- They should strive to move from the temptation of exploiting creation to the Franciscan concept of universal kinship. (OFS Rule 14)

Integral Ecology

- An integral ecology is inseparable from the notion of the common good, a central and unifying principle of social ethics. (156)
- Underlying the principle of the common good is respect for the human person (157)

Ecological Spirituality

- People can easily get caught up in a whirlwind of needless buying and spending. (203)
- Merely technical solutions run the risk of addressing symptoms and not the more serious underlying problems. (144)
- A change in lifestyle could bring healthy pressure to bear on those who wield political, economic and social power. (206)






Franciscan Teaching on Materialism

- Secular Franciscans should pledge themselves to reduce their own personal needs so as to be better able to share spiritual and material goods with their brothers and sisters, especially those most in need. (CG Article 15)
- They should give thanks to God for the goods they have received, using them as good stewards and not as owners. (CG Article 15)
- They should take a firm position against consumerism and against ideologies and practices which prefer riches over human and religious values and which permit the exploitation of the human person. (GC Article 15)

- What can you do to live more simply?
- Do you feel caught into a "use and throw away culture" when technological advances necessitate the purchase of new equipment without the option of upgrading your present one? Can you find a way out of this dilemma?
- What is the most urgent need of your society, and what can you do to educate others in this regard?
