LETTER FROM THE REGIONAL MINISTER

Dear, Brothers and Sisters,

MAY THE LORD GIVE YOU PEACE!

s I thought about my first column as Regional Minister, many topics came to mind. Upon further reflection, those topics all related to our Rule and since 2021 is the 800th anniversary of *Memoriale Propositi,* a document that inspired the earliest Brothers and Sisters of Penance, I decided to reflect on our Rule, our way of life.

As Article 3 of our Rule states: "The present rule, succeeding *Memoriale Propositi* and the rules approved by the Supreme Pontiffs Nicholas IV and Leo XIII, adapts the Secular Franciscan Order to the needs and expectations of the Holy Church in the conditions of changing times..."

As a side note, Pope Nicholas IV was the first Franciscan Pope and was the Minister General of the First Order from 1274-1279.

The Memoriale Propositi, which roughly translates to "a document for a project of life," laid out a good foundation for the first Brothers and Sisters of Penance. As Raffaele Pazzelli,TOR says in his book, *St. Francis and the Third Order,* "the increase in the number of penitents following the preaching of St. Francis and his early companions in the period between 1210 and 1220 must have been enormous." That growth made legislation necessary. Fr. Pazzelli goes on to say that "the Third Order is the 'school of the Gospel' and demands adherence to it of thought and action."

As Article 4 reminds us,

"...Secular Franciscans should devote themselves especially to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to gospel."

Our worldwide Secular Franciscan Order is making the 800th anniversary of *Memoriale Propositi* a year long celebration extending into 2022 due to COVID. Why not consider making the Rule a focus of your ongoing formation next year? As our National Minister, Jan Parker, OFS writes in her letter in the current (Fall 2021) issue of the *TAU-USA* newsletter there are many ways to celebrate this anniversary.

HER SUGGESTIONS INCLUDE:

1) READ, STUDY, AND LIVE THE RULE.

Begin with the Prologue, for there we hear from Francis himself. Francis was meticulous in avoiding distractions. Let's focus on who we are called to be and be careful about making excuses.

2) ONGOING FORMATION.

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There are at least six different "ready to go" exercises on the OFS Rule posted on our national website — secularfranciscansusa.org/formation-spirituality.

Excellent advice from our National Minister!

n preparation to celebrate the Feast Day of our holy father, St. Francis of Assisi this year, I signed up for a mini-retreat at St. Francis Retreat House in Easton, PA. This mini-retreat ran from October 1st to October 3rd and the presenter was Sister Mary Beth Ingham, C.S.J., PhD., from Orange, CA.

"Seized by Beauty"

Her Doctorate is in Medieval Philosophy with a concentration in the Franciscan Intellectual Tradition. Thus her focus that weekend came from the writings of St. Bonaventure and Blessed John Duns Scotus, both of whom were outstanding scholars and spiritual writers within the Franciscan School of Theology. Needless to say, I was intrigued by the title of her presentation, **"Seized by Beauty"**; a subtitle for her presentation could easily be: 'Creation and God's Extravagant Love.'

As we all know, St. John the Evangelist teaches us that "God is Love." However, the Franciscan School built on this concept by saying 'God is Extravagant Love' meaning that the love among the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit is so rich and all-consuming that it bursts forth in the very act of creation! When we read the story of creation in the Book of Genesis, we need to remember that at the end of each day, God looked at what He created and pronounced it 'good.' Finally, on the seventh day, God looked at all He had created and pronounced it 'very good."

As Sister Mary Beth spoke about beauty, I had a revelation. So often when thinking or speaking about beauty, both you and I might remember the saying "Beauty is in the eye of the beholder." I've always understood that expression to mean what you see as beautiful, I may not see it the same way, and that's just the way it is. In other words, the emphasis in that expression is on the "beholder." It's very subjective. However, if the emphasis is moved to the "eye", it takes on a whole new spiritual meaning if we strive 'to see as God sees.' WHOA! I never thought of that expression in that way! To be able to see both the outer beauty and the inner beauty of the world around us! We also need to look for the hidden beauty in creation that so often we fail to see.

This new insight helped me to see all of creation as **a pure gift from God.** For a moment, it took my breath away! As Franciscans, may we be seized by the beauty all around us in the coming days and weeks ahead. For now, I can say, this mini-retreat was God's **pure** gift to me! May this article be God's **pure** gift to you!

THE IMPORTANCE OF

PERMANENT (ONGOING) FORMATION

hen we talk about "formation" many Secular Franciscans immediately think about the period new members spend learning about the Secular Franciscan Order and how we live our Rule.

It is true that initial formation is indispensable if a person is to become a part of the Order. However, we need to keep in mind that **permanent (ongoing) formation is crucial to keeping our vocations strong and our fraternities healthy and growing.**

Article 44.1 of the General Constitutions tells us:

"Begun by the preceding stages, the formation of the brothers and sisters takes place in a **permanent and continuous way**. It should be understood as an aid in the conversion of each and everyone, and in the fulfillment of their proper mission in the Church and in society."

Article 44.3 speaks of how permanent (ongoing) formation is to be accomplished:

- "...by means of courses, gatherings, and the sharing of experience aims to assist the brothers and sisters:
- in listening to and meditating on the Word of God, "going from Gospel to life and from life to Gospel";
- in reflecting on events in the Church and in society in the light of faith and with the help of the documents of the Magisterium (Church teachings) consequently taking consistent positions;
- in updating and deepening their Franciscan vocation by studying the writings of Saint Francis, Saint Clare, and Franciscan authors."

As you can see, formation does not end with Profession.

Our permanent commitment to the gospel way of life marks the beginning of a lifetime of strengthening our vocation by continuing to learn and put into practice what we find in Scripture, the teachings of the Church, and the writings of Francis, Clare, Bonaventure, and the many other authors and theologians who are part of our Franciscan family.

When choosing topics for ongoing formation, we should keep in mind that the teachings and spirituality of Franciscans will help us know the charism of our Seraphic Father better.

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FORMATION

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It is also important to understand that just as with initial formation, the AGENTS OF FORMATION are: • The Holy Spirit; • the member him or herself; • the entire local fraternity; • the fraternity council; • the formation director and formation team; • the spiritual assistant; • sponsors assigned to new members; • higher levels of fraternity.

This means that we are responsible to keep ourselves up-to-date and to help keep the members of our fraternities well-versed in the Franciscan charism. We are responsible for forming ourselves AND forming one another.

In September the new leadership team of Our Lady of the Angels Regional Fraternity was elected. Although I believed that my time on the council was finished, the Holy Spirit and the Regional Fraternity Council thought otherwise. As your new Regional Formation Director, I've been praying a lot about how the Spirit would like us to move forward formation-wise in our region.

The first things that always come to my mind are **relationships, collaboration, and cooperation**. I am hoping that through the magic of Zoom, our regional formation team will be able to meet often. But, I would also love it if our **local formation directors** could meet with us on occasion to let us know their wants and needs. Perhaps they would like us to plan some **workshops** for them?

The Constitutions ask us to consider **joint initial formation classes**. We have already had a few in-person initial formation sessions in the past. We might try a few more virtually. **How wonderful if inquirers and candidates could get to know one another**. After all, they are the future of our region!

Perhaps we could also gather *anyone* interested to discuss some of the **Formation Friday** topics on Zoom. That seems like a "painless" way to get to know other members of our region without having to travel long distances.

In any event, you will be hearing from the Regional Formation team. We would also love to hear from you, and we hope that you will ask the Holy Spirit to inspire us in our service to the region.

HIS PAST AUGUST, WE GATHERED TOGETHER FOR THE ANNUAL REGIONAL RETREAT. SINCE WE WERE STILL IN THE MIDDLE OF THE COVID PANDEMIC, WE GATHERED TOGETHER VIRTUALLY ON ZOOM.

The retreat began on Friday with Evening Prayer and a small group sharing to reflect on our lives this past year. It continued on Saturday with a presentation by Fr. André Cirino, OFM, entitled "Bringing Forth Christ, Five Feasts of the Child Jesus" by St. Bonaventure.

Fr. André is a renowned Franciscan author who has written many books on Franciscan spirituality. He is also the Spiritual Assistant for Little Portion Fraternity in Mt. Vernon, NY. It was a great honor and pleasure to have Fr. André lead our retreat this year. The theme for this year's retreat was "The Five Feasts of the Child Jesus."

"The Five Feasts of the Child Jesus" is a reflective work by St. Bonaventure that he wrote in 1259. The Five Feasts emphasizes the "spiritual motherhood" of every Christian to bring to fruition the graces we have been given by God, doing what Mary herself did as the Mother of God.

In the first feast, the "Annunciation" Mary gave her "yes" to become the mother of Jesus. Although she didn't fully realize what that meant at the time, she was blessed with special graces from God to help her on her life journey.

Fr. André spoke about the special graces he has received and asked us to reflect upon the graces of God in our lives. How has God called us and how have we responded to His call?

The second feast, the "Nativity" Bonaventure reminds us that once someone has received a grace from God, that person needs to bring that grace to birth by following God's will. Fr. André spoke about his own call to enter the religious life as a Franciscan Friar and asked us to reflect upon how we have put into practice the graces God has given us.

The third feast, the "Feast of the Holy Name" Bonaventure reflects upon the name of Jesus, meaning "One who saves." Just like a parent names their child, we too, need to name the graces given to us by God. Fr. André provided a name for his grace from God and called it "vocation" We also have been given a grace from God to become Secular Franciscans. What name do we give to our calling?

The fourth feast, the "Epiphany" is the story of the Magi who seek out Jesus to adore Him and bring Him gifts. Fr. André reminded us that we must also seek out Jesus every day and bring Him our gifts of thanks, praise, and joy.

In the fifth feast, the "Presentation" Joseph and Mary brought Jesus to the Temple to be offered up to God, returning to God the highest good of all creation. In our lives, we too must offer up to God the goodness we have experienced in our lives. We must let our goodness flow to all those around us.

Fr. André concluded his presentation by asking us to reflect on the graces we've received, birthed, named, sought out, and returned to God. By living our Rule, we have become Spiritual Mothers to everyone we encounter and we make Jesus present in the world.

RELICS PRESENTATION BY FATHER CARLOS MARTINS, CC by MARY-FRANCES REAVEY, OFS

n October 19^{th,} 2021, I went to see the *Treasures of the Church* display at Mary Mother of God Church in Hillsborough, New Jersey. I knew ahead of time that there would be over 150 Relics on display and was interested to hear explanations of what makes something a relic and how they are verified as genuine.

I wasn't disappointed!

There was a presentation by Fr. Carlos Martins about how something becomes a relic and why we honor this item; he told the story of St Maria Goretti, the youngest Saint in the church, having died when she was 11 years old. I was interested in St. Pope John Paul II's relics which seem to be abundant, having so recently died there are many articles that he touched, and I was interested in St. Francis and St. Clare - for obvious reasons.

The most amazing relics were Mary's Veil and a piece of the True Cross. Fr. Martins explained the history behind the True Cross and why we can be sure it is the TRUE CROSS even after 2000 years.

Constantine the Great was the first Roman Emperor (reigned 306-337) to convert to Christianity in 312. He convoked the First Council of Nicaea in 325, which produced the statement of Christian belief known as the Nicene Creed. Constantine then sent his mother, Helena, (later St. Helena of the Cross) to Jerusalem to find the "Relics of Christian Tradition."

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The story, as told by Fr. Martins, is that Helena found the area believed to have been Golgotha – the place all hangings took place in that area. She had all the crosses they could find dug up, believing the True Cross was among the pieces.

With the help of a local Bishop, she had a severely ill woman brought to the site and when the woman touched the first of the crosses her condition remained the same. When she touched the last cross, her condition immediately improved. Helena declared that this must be the True Cross because it had miraculous powers that only the wood that touched Our Lord would have. A piece of that True Cross was on display. see below, left.

It was an amazing display and Fr. Martins suggested we go around the room to see

ecular Franciscan fraternities often come from humble beginnings. Such was the case for one particular fraternity that set down roots in a crumbling building in the South Bronx in 1982. The founding members were an unlikely group, of all ages, but with the same burning zeal in their hearts. They had come together to renovate a building, which eventually became a retreat house in the South Bronx. They began working together and then realized that they wanted something more permanent. Such austere beginnings are seldom documented, but this one is, in "Called to Serve: The Birth of a Secular Franciscan R Fraternity" by Toni Maconi, OFS, (taupublishing.com). Not only that, it stands as a testament to the strength of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

The book, which is now available on audio (available at assisijourney.com), details how the retreat house began as a dream. It also tells how that dream became a reality, and how it served the communities and people of the South Bronx. How the fraternity takes shape is no less interesting – from the moment this group of volunteers comes together, it is apparent they are of one heart, and within that heart burns a Franciscan flame.

There was no fraternity at first. As the volunteers got together to renovate the building, they simply tackled the task at hand: shoring up the structure, making the inside livable, begging for donations of furniture, appliances, bedding, and dishes. They didn't realize it, but they were living the Franciscan Rule long before any of them knew what the Rule was, or what it required. It was only in looking back did they see they had been living and working as Franciscans long before they knew it.

"Birth of a Secular Franciscan Fraternity" – both book and audio – takes a look at how the fraternity came to be, and how it was embraced by many, many people. It is an enduring fraternity - as active today (although the retreat house is now closed) as it was so many years ago. The OFS rule is a living, breathing thing, but it needs God's people to breathe life into it. And that is exactly what the founding members did - and continue to do today.

"Birth of a Secular Franciscan Fraternity" is not a how-to book for those looking to form a fraternity, but rather it is a promise of what could be, if those who want it are willing to work and sacrifice. It is available for purchase at taupublishing.com for \$14.95.

O MANY FRANCISCANS HAVE PASSED ON OVER THE YEARS FOR VARIOUS REASONS WITHOUT THE OPPORTUNITY TO BE THANKED, OR TO EXPRESS WORDS OF APPRECIATION FOR THEIR KINDNESS, HARD WORK, AND DEDICATION THEY GAVE TO THE FRANCISCAN ORDER.

I was professed in May of 1960 at St John the Baptist Church, in New York City, the St. Louis Fraternity. I remember the month and year because I was married the following month.
