

At the end of July, many of us were together at our Regional Retreat.


The theme of the weekend was Conversion. Here we experienced the beauty of God's




n the spirit of gathering together as a Franciscan - Family, the National Formation Commission recently hosted a National Formation Workshop for all of the

Regional Formation Directors throughout the United States.

The workshop took place from August 17 through August 20 at the Renaissance Marriott Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri. This was the same hotel that hosted the "Q" last Summer, so it was a good location for everyone to meet for 4 days of training and fellowship. By-the-way, St. Louis is also named after the patron saint of the OFS whose feast day we recently celebrated on August 25.

It was my privilege and honor to be able to represent our region at this gathering and I'd like to share my experiences of the workshop in this article.

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE Franciscan Formator and the Spiritual Assistant

The first talk of the workshop was given by Anne Mulqueen, OFS, she is the Spiritual Assistant to the National Formation Commission.



The purpose of Anne's talk was to help us better understand and appreciate the important relationship and bond that exists between the Formation Team and the Spiritual Assistant and to help everyone understand the responsibilities that exist within that relationship.

We learned that the Spiritual Assistant's primary responsibility is to assist the Formation Team and help them guide and animate formation in the fraternity and the region. The Spiritual Assistant is a valuable member of the Formation Team and should participate actively in every aspect of the formation process. We also learned that the role of the Regional Formation Team is to serve the local formation directors and to provide them with information, inspiration and training for their ministry.

Franciscan Formation is always centered on Christ and the Gospel.

Our Rule tells us that the life of the Secular Franciscan is to observe the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by following the examples of Saint Francis and Saint Clare.

Formation is ongoing and openended. Our formation doesn't end when we make our profession, rather it is a lifelong process of conversion.

As a Franciscan community, we are on a journey of conversion together and we are all called to love and support each other on this journey.

LEARNING WHO WE ARE, IMPLEMENTING THE F.U.N. MANUAL

After Anne's presentation, the workshop participants were divided up into groups so that we could create sample formation sessions from the F.U.N. Manual. This working session lasted for more than 5 hours over the next two days and was called "Learning Who We Are - Implementing the F.U.N. Manual". Our own Diane Menditto, OFS, led this session and helped each of the working groups to attain our goals.

In this session, we learned that we are not teachers, but formators, whose goal is to help those in formation understand what a vocation is,

discern whether or not they have a vocation and intensify their understanding of the Catholic Faith. We also learned that Franciscan formation includes the understanding of being a Franciscan and the importance of the OFS Rule in our lives.

After this short presentation by Diane, we broke up into teams to develop formation materials for chapters from the F.U.N. manual. My team was given the assignment of working on the "Vocation, Charism and Mission" chapter in the F.U.N. manual. Each team delivered a short presentation of the materials that they developed and everyone shared with each other what they learned from this exercise.



On Friday afternoon, we were all treated to an excellent presentation on Ongoing Formation by Francine Gikow, OFS. We learned from Francine that ongoing formation is a process of renewal for the entire fraternity that results in developing an environment of continual conversion.

We learned that Ongoing Formation is Trinitarian. As our past National Formation Director, Bob Fitzsimmons, OFS has said, "The real purpose of formation is to set one's feet on a path leading to an ever-deepening Trinitarian relationship until we can fully say it is Christ who lives in us."

Francine's presentation and group sharing was a good way for everyone to wrap up our two long days of efforts at the Workshop. The National Formation Team had us going from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m, but I do have to admit that I did get a chance to sneak in a swim or two in the hotel pool during our breaks:)

The National Formation Workshop was an excellent opportunity for me to deepen my understanding

of the role of formation in the life of a Secular Franciscan.

Look for future articles and training to the clusters and fraternities on all of the presentations given during this workshop. It was my honor to be able to represent our region at this workshop and I appreciate all the love and support given to me from everyone in our region.

JUSTICE, PEACE AND THE INTEGRITY OF CREATION

s I sat down to write this column (2017, September), there were many topics I could have picked. The situation in North Korea, the Season of Creation, Hurricane Harvey and President Trump's consideration on a decision to end the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) Program. Since they are all important, I'll spend some time on each.



NORTH KOREA seems to be getting more brazen with each test. I pray that those tests and the vitriol surrounding them does not escalate.

In July, I attended the National JPIC Animate Peace Conference in St. Louis. While there, North Korea conducted another nuclear test. Before we departed, we issued a press release urging the world community "to use prayer, caution, wisdom, earnest discernment and patience" before responding to recent developments on the Korean peninsula.

HERE IS THE ENTIRE STATEMENT:

"We, the National Commission of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) of the U.S. Secular Franciscan Order met July 27-30, 2017 in St. Louis, Missouri for a National Animate Peace Gathering. Twenty JPIC Animators from around the nation gathered for a weekend of sharing, learning and fellowship.

During the gathering, North Korea launched an Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM), which has heightened tensions in the world.

In the Gospel Spirit of St. Francis of Assisi, we urge the world community to use prayer, caution, wisdom, earnest discernment and patience before responding to these recent developments on the Korean peninsula.

Any use or threat of use of nuclear weapons is a crime against humanity and all creation. Our efforts towards mutual respect and understanding should be long-term."

Since then, things have escalated with a hydrogen bomb test and a statement from **Defense Secretary** James Mattis warning of a "massive military response" to any threat against us or our allies.

Pray that diplomacy and not escalation prevails in diffusing this situation.

CREAT THE SEASON OF **CREATION**

began on September 1st and ends on the feast of St. Francis, October 4th. During this time Christians around the world are praying and caring for creation. We are uniting for one purpose — to Steward the Earth. This is a time for us to turn our full attention to God the Creator and toward our relationship with the whole of Creation.

Our National JPIC Animator, Carolyn Townes, OFS, reminds us that Our Holy Father encourages us to join him and millions of other Christians around the world, to pray and "reaffirm our personal vocation to be stewards of creation, to thank God for the wonderful handiwork which He has entrusted to our care and to implore His help for the protection of creation as well as His pardon for the sins committed against the world in which we live."



Our Regional Minister, Diane Menditto, OFS, sent a letter to all local ministers regarding an e-mail received from our National Treasurer, Jerry Rousseau, OFS, asking for our help in responding to a request from the Los Tres Companeros Region and the St. Joan of Arc Region where there has been major destruction from Hurricane Harvey. Those regions, which cover Louisiana, Texas and Mississippi have been extremely hard hit with more rain to come!

As with last year's catastrophe in the Baton Rouge area, the National Executive Council is establishing a "Flood Victims" Fund to provide direct aid to fraternity members severely affected within these two regions. Our Regional Executive Council voted to send a contribution and has reached out to our local fraternities to consider joining them in this effort. This is a completely FREE WILL offering.



Finally, President Trump is considering a decision to end the 2012 program called the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (D.A.C.A.). This program protects nearly 800,000 undocumented immigrants who were brought with their families to the U.S. as children. DACA affords these young people appropriately referred to as Dreamers, the opportunity to work and study in the U.S. free from the threat of deportation.

For many *Dreamers*, the U.S. is the only home they have ever known. They did not make the decision to enter the country — they arrived with their parents, who came here in search of a better life for their families.

More than 97 percent of them are students or are in the workforce. They are taxpayers. They are law-abiding. This transcends politics. Pray that the President does not rescind DACA and that Congress enacts a permanent solution.

JPIC AND YOUTH CONFERENCE

RECAP OF THE NAFRA GATHERING ON THE TOPIC OF YOUTH / YOUNG ADULT GROUP

was blessed with the opportunity to attend the NAFRA Gathering on the Topic of Youth in St. Louis, Missouri, from July 27-30, 2017.



After having spent my teenage years immersed in experiential learning of the Franciscan charism through Capuchin Youth & Family Ministries (CYFM) in Garrison, NY, this gathering made me feel like I was back at CYFM, only brought to a national scale with my Franciscan fraternity members from across the country. In St. Louis, the prayers and music that leaders and participants shared helped us relive our youth, including Jan Parker's guitar skills and musical talent!

Before attending, we were asked to read several YouFra documents in preparation for the meeting. When reading the responses about youth/young adult engagement by regional fraternities in the fraternities' annual reports and in the Management of the Order Survey, I was surprised to learn how few regions across the country are working on youth engagement. However, at the meeting I was encouraged to learn what others are doing and encouraged by how inclusive and participatory the meeting was.

We had a small group activity to envision what a Franciscan youth/young adult group would look like; worked on revising the vision for YouFra in the U.S. and the YouFra Commission Chair position description.



We discussed many examples of what works when engaging youth that will be incorporated into a toolkit — (Youth want to be listened to, like to do service, may enjoy being asked to write an article about Justice, Peace & Integrity of Creation (JPIC) for a fraternity or parish and that it's best to be authentic when talking to youth).

I was also excited about the idea of collaborating with International YouFra members. It felt very "Franciscan" in nature to be repairing something in need of repair.

Another element of the meeting were the talks by Br. Richard Contino, OSF, one of the Franciscan Brothers of Brooklyn. Br. Richard spoke about, "21st Century Franciscans Gospel Shifts and Ripples: Creating a Culture of Christ through a Holy Silence and a Joyful Noise." He believes so much in the Franciscan formation of youth that he teaches youth every day.

One of the nuggets of wisdom I got from his talk is that youth are not perfect, but rather than get discouraged and trying to point out everything they're doing wrong, it's important to encourage youth by pointing out what they are doing right. He compared it to the Parable of the Weeds (Mt.13: 24-30): our role is to let the weeds and the wheat grow together, as God will take care of the weeds.

After reading an article about how youth and young adults of today are "lost," I was able to share an alternative, that perhaps the Church just isn't providing enough support in helping youth navigate the environment around them, the way the staff at CYFM did for my peers and me when we were teenagers.

We need to remember that today's Catholic youth and young adults are being formed by the church and the secular world in the age of Vatican II, which is more ecumenical & welcoming of interreligious dialogue than the Roman Catholic Church has been in ages past.

Pope Francis is a wonderful example of how the message of the Catholic church can be truly "catholic," or universal, and his message appeals to many Catholics and non-Catholics alike.

For me, and I believe for other young adults as well, being able to connect our religious experience to our secular world experience through the learning about Catholic Social Teaching and JPIC is very important. People need tangible examples of how to live out their faith. The Secular Franciscan Rule (#4) says that "Secular Franciscans should devote themselves especially to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to the gospel."

> People seek what gives them meaning, and if they don't see the church bringing the Gospel to Life - unless they have a true Franciscan conviction to repair the institution of the church - they may seek spirituality elsewhere.

It's hopeful to see more synergy develop within the Secular Franciscan Order's various commissions.

As the Gathering on the Topic of Youth was happening at the same time as the JPIC gathering in St. Louis, a number of participants of both groups expressed a desire to see more connection between the two commissions.

Carolyn Townes, OFS, the national JPIC Animator for NAFRA, suggested that the three commissions-(JPIC, Youth & Young Adults and Formation) be better aligned in the future.

If Secular Franciscans embody a true witness of the Secular Franciscan Rule, (which includes all of these parts of the Franciscan charism), it could set a powerful example for Franciscan-hearted people to get a taste of how Franciscan community can be the beloved community.

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


Members of the St. Mary's Church participated in the Readings. Music was provided by Carrie Stewart.


After the final hymn was concluded, Fr. Richard invited all of us for wine and cheese and fellowship with one another.

Some people sing when they pray. Some people dance. Others do yoga.

hat's exactly what a group of Secular Franciscans did during their annual retreat at Mt. Alvernia in Wappingers Falls on August 4 - 6. 2017. Many got themselves out of bed each day at 7:00 a.m. for a Holy Yoga class. Some sat in chairs, others sat on mats. All faced the huge San Damiano cross hanging in the lounge and took an hour to breathe, move and pray.

The Annual Retreat is a chance for regional Seculars to gather together, break bread, pray and build fraternity. Holy Yoga was first offered to Seculars in 2016 as a retreat option during free time; it was well received and I was invited back to teach this year.

I have been a Secular Franciscan for more than 30 years and an avid practitioner of yoga for 12. I always welcome the opportunity to combine these two passions. I came to yoga late in life, yet immediately I found a spiritual connection in my practice. Over time, I saw that my strongest prayer time was when I stepped onto my mat.

I trained to become a Vinyasa instructor, then discovered Holy Yoga when I attended a class at my church in New Fairfield, Connecticut. I had already been praying privately when I attended traditional yoga classes. I was thrilled to find a class where my Christian beliefs were openly accepted and shared. I soon learned that Holy Yoga, an international nonprofit ministry, had trained more than 1,000 instructors across the world. They teach in churches, civic centers and traditional yoga studios. Holy Yoga, Inc., also operates safe houses for trafficked women and children, offering them medical care, healing yoga and other services. I became a Holy Yoga instructor and this year completed my Masters' training.

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There are many misconceptions about yoga and Christianity. Yoga is not a religion, but rather a spiritual discipline, much like meditation, prayer, and fasting. I've been told by some critics that yoga "opens up the soul to the devil" and that it goes against Christianity. My response to them is that while I have great respect for traditional yoga beliefs, my Christian faith is strong, and doing Downward Facing Dog (or any other yoga pose) is not going to compromise that.

It was brought to my attention on the retreat that Pope Francis has said yoga cannot open our hearts to God. In truth, he was referring to more traditional yoga practices and I believe he would find little fault with a class that begins with a reading of the Gospel and ends with a prayer of gratitude to Jesus.

If anything, my practice has strengthened my connection to God. In a Holy Yoga class, we practice traditional poses, but the focus is different. We strive to connect our entire being — body, mind and spirit — with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We open and close with prayer and scripture. Students are encouraged to make their Sun Salutations (we call them "Son" Salutations) a moving meditation.

During our final resting pose, we do not try to empty our minds, but open ourselves to God's presence and listen. I often offer a final blessing to each student, if they wish to receive it, with an anointing of frankincense and myrrh.

When we practice Holy Yoga, we bring to mind Mark 12:30: Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. Our practice is not just exercise, but prayer and meditation, using body, mind and spirit.

When we breathe, we think of Job 33:4: The Spirit of God has made me; the breath of the Almighty gives me life. Our breath is deeply connected to God; we recognize that this life breath came directly from him and it serves to nourish our bodies as well as propel us through our poses.

When we step onto our mats, we do so with all our frailties, our weaknesses, our vulnerabilities. And yet none of that is paramount, for we are loved by God despite our imperfections. There is no judgment in a Holy Yoga class. It matters not what your body looks like, or the level of your practice.


The word "yoga" means to yoke or bind.

We come to yoke our breath and movement to God, therefore making our practice a form of worship.

So why should Secular Franciscans practice yoga?

If we can encounter God anywhere, as St. Francis believed, why not on a yoga mat?

When we practice yoga, we are transformed from the inside out. Each asana or pose changes us physically in some way - we become stronger, more flexible and relaxed.

We are then open to God's grace. Our hearts transform as our bodies change, just as Francis was transformed:

*Thomas of Celano, Second Life, Chapter VI: 10

With his heart completely changed - soon his body was also to be changed -He was walking one day by the church of San Damiano, which was abandoned by everyone and almost in ruins. Led by the Spirit he went in to pray and knelt down devoutly before the crucifix. He was shaken by unusual experiences and discovered that he was different from when he had entered.

Not long ago I visited an art gallery during a trip to Assisi. On the wall hung a huge painting of St. Francis before the San Damiano cross.

He was on his knees, bent forward, head touching the floor, arms outstretched, in what looked exactly like yoga's Child Pose. I thought, how perfect. He was surrendering to God's will - and using his body as a gesture of that surrender.

The Seculars who attended those three classes on retreat were invited to bring themselves before God in a new and different way. In keeping with the weekend theme of Reconciliation, we looked at three ways we can be reconciled: with God, with ourselves and with the world around us.

Saints Francis and Clare knew that God's love included forgiveness and that it was important that reconciliation be an important part of life because it brings about hope and change.

Our poses reflected that - heart opening poses to receive grace and forgiveness and in turn, bring that to the world around us.

We practiced forward folds poses of surrender — in which we offered our weaknesses up so that we might be forgiven.

We went into Child's Pose, arms outstretched, palms face up, as a sign of our willingness to give ourselves over to God's grace.

Throughout all of the classes, we were stretching and strengthening our bodies, in effect, maintaining these beautiful temples we have been given. We moved through our poses with prayerful grace. Our final relaxation pose was a chance to rest in Him.

Yoga can bring you closer to God. All you need to do is step onto the mat.






OF COURSE, PRAYERS AND ST. FRANCIS ARE FOREMOST.
