

We have many sources of initial and ongoing formation materials available to us, but we should choose wisely. It can be easy to forget that formation must be more than information.

Born and raised in the Bronx. Frances is the oldest of three girls. Her family currently live in North Carolina and she looks forward to visiting in the Summer.




Everlyn PACHECO-YORK

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

Happy and joyous Easter!

y the time you read this, Easter Sunday will have come and gone, but our Lord and brother, Jesus Christ, is always with us. The great love that Jesus showed through His Death and Resurrection is given to us and resides in us every day of the year through the Gift of Holy Spirit, the Breath of God.

Some friends from the National Formation Commission and I have started a weekly e-mail "book club." We have been reading, Breath of God: Living a Life Led by the Holy Spirit by Fr. Dave Pivonka, TOR. E TWO FEET OF LOVE IN A

t the Chapter of Ministers in November 2017, I had the opportunity to lead the ongoing formation portion of the agenda. The topic I chose was The Two Feet of Love in Action, based on some of Pope Benedict XVI's encyclicals. In Deus Caritas Est, Pope Benedict XVI describes the "unbreakable bond between love of God and love of neighbor" (number 16). The experience of God's love, he says, should move us to love our neighbors, in whom God is present. In the same way, Pope Francis notes: "A prayer that does not lead you to practical action for your brother (or sister) - the poor, the sick, those in need of help, anyone in difficulty - is a sterile and incomplete prayer" (Angelus, 7/21/13).

But what should this loving action look like? The Catholic tradition recognizes two types of necessary responses that we call the Two Feet of Love in Action. They are distinct, but complementary ways of responding in love to the needs of our neighbor.

The first foot is the **SOCIAL JUSTICE** foot.

We walk with this foot by fostering peace and justice and seeking long term change in local and global communities. We step with this foot when we work to remove the root causes of problems, when we support the efforts of low income persons to transform their communities, when we advocate for just public policies, and when we help change the social structures that contribute to suffering and injustice at home and around the world.

Sometimes we have to address injustices within systems and structures to ensure that those who are disadvantaged have equal opportunities to succeed. Things like expanding access to affordable housing, extending legal protection to unborn children, supporting environmental protection laws and promoting peace are some examples of how we can step with the social Justice foot.

The second foot is the **CHARITABLE WORKS** foot.

We step with this foot when we work to aid or assist others both locally and globally to meet their immediate, short term needs. Pope Benedict XVI says "the simple response to immediate needs and specific situations: feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, caring for and healing the sick, visiting those in prison, etc." are good examples of Charitable Works (Deus Caritas Est, # 31).

We step first with the Social Justice foot and second with the Charitable Works foot.

Social Justice, addressing the root causes of issues that face poor and vulnerable people, should come first because, as Pope Benedict XVI explains in Caritas in Veritate, "If we love others with charity, then first of all we are just towards them" (number 6). St. John Chrysostom also captures this idea when he writes, "The demands of justice must be satisfied first of all; that which is already due in justice is not to be offered as a gift of charity (quoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, # 2446).

COMMISSION

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As Catholics, we believe that the kingdom of God is both a future goal and in our midst now. During His time on earth, Jesus proclaimed the kingdom of God both through His words and His actions to heal the sick, clothe the naked, and free the oppressed (Luke 4:18). We are called to follow in His footsteps and help make God's kingdom present on earth. As he lay dying, St. Francis told his brothers (and us, his followers),

"I have done what was mine to do, may Christ now teach you what you are to do."

There are two different, but complementary ways that we can walk the path of love, or caritas. We call these the "Two Feet of Love in Action," based on Pope Benedict XVI's reflections in Deus Caritas Est (God is Love) and Caritas in Veritate (Charity in Truth).



"Mindful that they are bearers of peace which must be built up unceasingly, they should seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue, trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon." (OFS Rule, Art. 19)

"Serve the person in front of you, return the goodness to God and show actions."

Sister Yang spoke about the true joy she

witnessed by the Zambian people who were so poor, yet lived with the true joy of life and hope. Sister Yang lived in Zambia for seven years as a missionary and she sometimes wondered whether her presence would interfere with their lives because she saw how truly happy they were in the midst of poverty.

We also had the pleasure and honor to have two guests: U.S.A. NATIONAL MINISTER, JAN PARKER, OFS, AND REGIONAL MINISTER OF OUR LADY OF THE ANGELS, DIANE F. **MENDITTO, OFS,** both of whom presented the structure of Orders for Franciscans. These two presentations provided us with the true meaning of who we are. It gave us the opportunity to examine ourselves and to find the way of life and identity as Secular Franciscans.



Finally, on Saturday night there was a talent show with each fraternity highlighting their amazing talents. Some sang songs; other performed a play with creative costumes.

It was quite an enjoyable time filled with laughter and fellowship.

The abundance of the Holy Spirit was in the air as we felt the presence of fullness and oneness. The talent show was the highpoint of the Congress as we all shared the creative talents that God has uniquely given us. The purpose of Anne's talk was to help us understand the relationship between the OFS and the Spiritual Assistant and to help us understand the boundaries that exist within that relationship.



1. THE ROLE OF THE SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT IS: D) ALL OF THE ABOVE.

The Spiritual Assistant serves the fraternity's council and is responsible for maintaining the "Vital Reciprocity" between the OFS, the 1st Order/TOR and the Church. The Spiritual Assistant's knowledge of Franciscan spirituality and the Secular Franciscan lifestyle is essential to serving the OFS as a Spiritual Assistant. "A Spiritual Assistant 'assists' and is not the 'director (boss!)' of fraternity life." The Spiritual Assistant participates "in the discussions and decisions of the council" and shows "servant-leadership as a modeler council and fraternity. The Spiritual Assistant does not vote on economic matters or in elections". Also "Spiritual Assistants are expected to be present at council meetings and the regular gatherings of the fraternity."

2. THE TERM LIMIT FOR A SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT IS: C) 12 YEARS.

"The term limit of a Spiritual Assistant to the same fraternity is 12 consecutive years. Provincials may appoint a Spiritual Assistant for a chapter term, i.e. the period of time between 1st Order/TOR provincial chapters. That term may be 3 or more years depending on the time between chapters. The appointment ends when the 12 year limit is reached." ("Franciscan Family Connections", pg. 4)

3. A SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT MUST BE A PRIEST: B) FALSE.

According to the General Constitutions, "the spiritual assistant should be a Franciscan religious, member of the First Order or TOR" But, when it is not possible, "religious brothers and sisters of other Franciscan institutes" or 'diocesan clerics or other persons, specifically prepared for such service, who are members of the OFS" or "other diocesan clerics or non-Franciscan religious" may serve as the Spiritual Assistant to a fraternity.

DEACON BILL JOYCE, OFS St. Anne's Fraternity Fair Lawn, NJ

y Newark, NJ, deacons' class was ordained on December 12th, 1976.

Two weekends before, the class made our pre-ordination retreat. On the Saturday of the retreat, the diaconate program introduced us to the Liturgy of the Hours. Each man received a copy of the one volume Christian Prayer. The retreat master told us that there was not a more fitting time to begin than at the beginning and Saturday night, with Evening Prayer I for Sunday. As the Church began its new year, we would begin our lifelong daily celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours.

In the Catholic Church's ordination rite for deacons, each deacon candidate resolves to celebrate the Liturgy of the Hours, the public prayer of our Church. After using Christian Prayer for over four years, I graduated to the four volume Roman -Franciscan Liturgy of the Hours. By then I had begun my Inquiry period with the Secular Franciscans. Besides being married to my wife, Judy, for over fifty years and being a deacon in the Roman Catholic Church, being a Secular Franciscan is the greatest joy of my life.

Our Order, originally the Brothers and Sisters of Penance, is almost eight hundred years old, and was founded by our Holy Father Francis of Assisi just five years before his death. We are part of the family Francis founded. The Franciscan family has always prayed the Liturgy of the Hours. All clergy (including deacons), as well as professed religious (nuns, sisters, monks, friars, etc.) are required to pray all or part of the Liturgy of the Hours. (Western Carolina University Catholic Campus Ministry Praying with the Church August 23rd, 2016.)

SECULAR FRANCISCAN RULE CHAPTER II


Rule 8. As Jesus was the true worshipper of the Father, so let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do. Let them participate in the sacramental life of the Church, above all the Eucharist. Let them join in liturgical prayer in one of the forms proposed by the Church, reliving the mysteries of the life of Christ.

GENERAL CONSTITUTIONS 2000 ARTICLE 14

Section 4. The brothers and sisters, as well as the fraternities, should adhere to the indications of the Ritual with respect to the different forms of participating in the liturgical prayer of the Church, giving priority to the celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours. According to our Secular Franciscan Rule, the Liturgy of the Hours, at least Morning and Evening Prayer, takes precedence over all other prayers, except for Eucharistic worship and the sacraments. When our Holy Father Francis established our Order, most Europeans were illiterate. Only the clergy and a few lay people were cold read; only clergy celebrated the Liturgy of the Hours. For centuries, Secular Franciscans have prayed the "Office of the Twelve Our Fathers." continued on next page

In the Secular Franciscan Companion, we read that Morning Prayer or Evening Prayer, depending on time of day, is the preferred prayer at fraternity meetings. (p. 86)

LITURGY OF THE HOURS? **DIVINE OFFICE? BREVIARY?**

All three names refer to the official prayer of the Church, which is offered at various times of the day in order to sanctify the entire day. Clergy and religious have a canonical obligation to pray the Liturgy of the Hours as official representatives of the Church. Increasingly, the laity are also praying it, though they do not do so in the name of the Church.

LITURGY OF THE HOURS -

From liturgia horarium (L) and the Greek, leitourgia, a public service performed by an official. Each part of the Liturgy of the Hours is called an hour. There are three major hours, Office of Readings, Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer, and the minor hours of Daytime Prayer and Night Prayer.

DIVINE OFFICE - From officium divina (L.), a divine service or duty.

Breviary - From *breviarium* (L.), a compendium (of the canonical hours). The Divine Office is also called the *Opus Dei* (the Work of God). (EWTN- Liturgy of the Hours)

My late pastor referred to the Liturgy of the Hours as Onus Dei (the Burden of God). That has not been my experience, except every once in a while, as I'm turning off the light on my night stand, I remember that I hadn't celebrated Evening Prayer. That's why I always keep a copy of Christian Prayer on the night stand.

We Franciscans have our own versions of both Christian Prayer and the Liturgy of the Hours. Our versions have Franciscan supplement books (Proper Offices of Franciscan Saints and Blesseds, and other Franciscan celebrations), one for each of the four volumes of the Liturgy of the Hours, and the half inch thick Franciscan supplement for Christian Prayer.

The Sacred Liturgy is the Church's official public and communal worship. While the celebration of the Eucharist is the Church's principal act of worship, the Liturgy also includes the celebration of the six additional sacraments, the official daily prayer of the Church (the Liturgy of the Hours), and liturgies for special celebrations. As the Church's official worship, each of these liturgies has at its heart the celebration of the "Mystery of our Faith" that is, the sacred passion, death and resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ. This mystery, known as the Paschal Mystery, is the continuing work of our redemption by Christ and through his Church. (Archdiocese of Philadelphia Liturgical Catechesis No. 1, December 2010)

"Liturgy" comes from the Greek, meaning public work or duty. The Liturgy of the Hours is the official public prayer of the Church. Liturgical prayer is never truly directed to saints and angels, but to God, and most often to the Father, through the Son, in the Holy Spirit. The rosary and devotions, even held in church, are not liturgical prayer (EWTN- Liturgical Prayer).

The origins of the Liturgy of the Hours go back to the daily sacrifices in the Temple at Jerusalem after the Babylonian exile. The early Christians continued the Jewish practice of reciting prayers at certain hours of the day or night. The Divine Office carries into the twenty-first the custom of sanctifying the entire day, by adoring, petitioning, thanking and making atonement to our Creator, from sunrise to long after sunset.

The Liturgy of the Hours centers on the Psalms. In the Psalms are found expressions like "In the morning I offer you my prayer" (Psalm 5:3); "At midnight I will rise and thank you" (Psalm 119:62); "Evening, morning and at noon I will cry and lament" (Psalm 55:17); "Seven times a day I praise you" (Psalm 119:164). Psalms are David's prayers of petition, adoration, thanksgiving and atonement.

The Apostles observed the Jewish custom of praying at the third, sixth and ninth hour and at midnight (Acts 10:3, 9; 16:25; etc.). The Christian prayer of that time consisted of almost the same elements as the Jewish: recital or chanting of psalms, readings from the Old Testament, to which were soon added readings of the Gospels, Acts, epistles, and canticles.

Other elements were added later in the course of the centuries (allabouththevirginmary.com/liturgy-ofthe-hours.html).

The Office of Readings is the longest hour. The 1970 reforms of the Liturgy of the Hours replaced Matins with the Office of Readings. We may now celebrate the Office of Readings at any time at all, whatever is most convenient. It is permitted to pray, after Evening Prayer, the Office of Readings for the following day. (<u>Universalis.com</u>) 1

When I began praying the Divine Office, I used the one volume, Christian Prayer. I employed Christian Prayer for four years. Christian Prayer, to my mind, lacks in two areas. Christian Prayer has only the first week of Daytime Prayer, while the Liturgy of the Hours has all four weeks of Daytime Prayer. Additionally, there are very few Biblical and Non-Biblical Readings. The Non-Biblical Readings for the Commons of Saints totaled eight.

The Non-Biblical Readings for Saints are quite good, often written by the saint, or penned by a contemporary about the saint. Those readings alone are enough of a good reason to use the four volume Liturgy of the Hours. The four volume set isn't cheap, but one can purchase new or used volumes one at a time.

I changed to the Liturgy of the Hours because, after four years of celebrating the office, I had a pretty good idea how the Breviary worked. But also, in that time, I had become a Secular Franciscan Inquirer, then Candidate, and I learned that we Franciscans had our own versions of the breviaries; Roman-Franciscan Christian Prayer, and Roman-Franciscan Liturgy of the Hours. The Franciscan supplemental volumes accompanying the breviaries have the Proper Non-Biblical Readings for each Franciscan Saint or Blessed.

The supplemental volumes and breviary covers are available by mail or online.

The Catholic Book Publishing Company comes out with an annual guide to Roman-Franciscan Christian Prayer and to Roman-Franciscan Liturgy of the Hours (4 volume edition). The guides list the page numbers in the breviaries and supplements for every day of the year. After forty years of celebrating the Divine Office, I still find the guides indispensible.

Many folks now celebrate the Divine Office on hand-held electronic devices. My wife does. One problem is that the breviary websites don't include all our Franciscan saints, blesseds, and celebrations (e.g., the Stigmata of St. Francis; All Saints of the Seraphic Order; All Souls of the Seraphic Order). A solution may be to use the supplement Proper Offices of Franciscan Saints and Blesseds in the Liturgy of the Hours for the One-Volume edition of Christian Prayer. Also available online. Disclosure - I have no ownership interest in any book business, brick and mortar or online. I'm just passing along what I've learned.

SOME ODDS AND ENDS

The liturgical celebrations of Sundays and Solemnities begin at Evening Prayer on the previous night. Evening Prayer I of Sunday is effectively Saturday Evening Prayer, but it is part of the Sunday celebration (similarly to how Saturday evening masses tend to be the Mass of Sunday).

(Catholic Answers Forum June 2016)

The first hour of the daily Office (Office of Reading or Morning Prayer) begins with the Invitatory. This consists of the verse, "Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will proclaim your praise," followed by a psalm. Psalms 95, 100, 67, or 24 may be used. The invitatory psalm should not be repeated in the Psalter. (e.g., Psalm 24 appears in Morning Prayer-Tuesday Week I. Another invitatory psalm should be substituted.)

(General Instruction of the Liturgy of the Hours II—I section 34).

All subsequent hours, including the minor hours (Daytime and Night Prayer) start with the verse Psalm 70:2 (as did all offices before the Second Vatican Council except Matins and Compline) "God come to my assistance, Lord make haste to help me", followed by the Glory be to the Father...

Night Prayer after Evening Prayer I or II for Sunday may be used for every day of the week. After a few weeks I had Sunday's Night Prayer memorized, so I celebrate Night Prayer after I turn off the light for the evening.

Office of Reading and Morning Prayer may be combined as a single office. The other hours should be prayed separately.

Evening Prayer may be celebrated "when the lamps are lit," (newadvent.org) "after the end of the day's work." "at dusk." "When evening approaches and the day is already far spent." (divineoffice.org) "at 6 p.m." (newadvent.org) An early name for Evening Prayer is lucernarium, literally "lamp-lighting time," referring to the candles lit for this service when it was held in the early evening. (brittanica.com)

The Psalms and Canticle from Daniel prayed in Morning Prayer on Sunday Week I are also used for Morning Prayer on Solemnities and Feasts.

New breviaries come with two inserts: one for the Sunday Week I Psalter and the other for the Canticles of Zechariah, Mary, Simeon, and the Te Deum.


Keep cardstock photo copies of them in the breviary; put the originals in a safe place. The inserts will come in handy. Alternately, in my first breviary, I photocopied the Canticles insert and pasted them inside the covers of the book.

The idea of a tithe, a tenth of property being returned to God, appears in Genesis (14:20). Even today we speak of returning to God a portion of our time. talent and treasure. There are fourteen hundred forty minutes in a day. So a tenth of a day is two hours and twentyfour minutes.

Are we giving God His daily tithe of time? Daily Mass, the Liturgy of the Hours, the Franciscan Crown, other prayers and devotions, help us return to God a portion of the limited time which He has given to each of us.

The Liturgy of the Hours, the official prayer of the Catholic Church, binds together all of us who celebrate its hours.

As I pray, even alone in my room, I know I'm praying along with priests, monks, nuns, friars, clerics and especially my Franciscan brothers and sisters, who are praying, too, all around the world.



ONE SECULAR FRANCISCAN'S

ast year, as we were returning from the 2017 Regional Convivenza meeting, fellow Secular Franciscan and friend, Danuta Wyszynski, OFS. Minister of the St. Stephen's Fraternity in Perth Amboy, NJ shared a very special story of the events that occurred in Poland after (Saint) Pope John Paul II consecrated the world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary on March 25, 1984.

The years of 1988 through 1990 had brought forth many changes. There were Round Table Talks and a seemingly endless series of negotiations. Soon after, the Polish Communist Party ceased to exist. Russian troops left Legnica, Poland. The Solidarity Movement in Poland was at its height and November 9, 1989, saw the Berlin Wall fall. A new Poland was created and Lech Walesa was elected President.

Now residing in the U.S., Danuta carefully monitored the changes taking place in her native Poland. She also gave a great amount of thought about Our Lady's Fatima messages.

Certain her country's changing events were connected with the Fatima prophecy, in 1988, Danuta



felt inspired to paint a picture of what she was sure was Our Lady's Victory which she titled.

"THE ROSARY AS SALVATION FOR THE WORLD."

The 50"x 32" painting depicts the world 71 years after the warning Our Lady gave back in Fatima, Portugal in 1917,

"If people do not turn back to God, the errors of Russia will spread throughout the entire world."

"Pray the Rosary" was the plea.

In the painting, Our Lady is offering the Rosary, as an anchor. It symbolizes prayer for the Salvation of Mankind.

When the Cross touches the ground, it sheds light upon it. Just as Lady's prophecy predicted, ... "in the end, my Immaculate Heart will triumph."

The multitude of people headed to the Cross must pass through the red field (representing the errors of (Russia) communism that spread throughout the world).

Towards the left, are the ruins after the communist takeover.

Towards the right, is a monument of Lenin standing on top of a tower with a hammer representing communism. Below it, a clock showing the time of 5 minutes to 12, symbolizing the time of Communism in Poland is officially ending.

The people standing around the monument represent are what we call "do-gooders", naive supporters of Communism, or as Lenin called them, "useful idiots".

The painting hung in her bedroom over 25 years when once again, Danuta felt inspired, this time to share it with others.

She offered it to the National Blue Army Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima located in Washington, NJ, where it was gratefully accepted by the Executive Director of the Center, David M. Carollo during the Shrine's Centennial celebrations.

On September 13, 2017 — the painting was blessed by Bishop Nicholas DiMarzio during Holy Mass celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Fifth Apparition of Our Lady of Fatima.

The painting will be permanently displayed in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for all to view.

Though Danuta is pleased with the painting's new home, it is an honor which she takes with great humility.

IT IS IMPORTANT FOR YOU TO KNOW

That in the last fifteen years the Secular Franciscan formation process has become more robust and challenging. From the time someone comes to the fraternity as an observer, it now takes three years or more of study for them to become professed members.

WE TAKE OUR VOCATIONS **VERY SERIOUSLY** knowing that we have professed a Rule that asks us to live the Gospel after the example of St. Francis by imitating Jesus on our journey to the Father, strengthened by the Holy Spirit.

We are marking the **40**th anniversary of the approval of the Secular Franciscan Rule by Blessed Pope Paul VI in his letter Seraphicus Patriarcha (June 24, 1978).

The Rule of 1978 and our General Constitutions have reshaped the Order with a new dynamism and self-identity and redefined our relationship with the friars as equal partners in the Franciscan family.

We also take our life in fraternity very seriously— it is what encourages us to live the Gospel through collaboration with our Franciscan fraternities and by reaching out to others through our many apostolates.

One of our outreach programs remains within the Franciscan family.

Our Lady of the Angels Region now has an Outreach to our retired friars. The members of this apostolate send notes, cards and small gifts to the friars in the infirmary in Beacon and also to the OFM Friars of Holy Name Province in Ringwood and in Butler. The group is growing because our members love the friars and want to maintain contact and fraternity with them.

SPEAKING OF FRATERNITY, DID YOU KNOW ...

- That our Rule tells us that we must request suitable and well-prepared Spiritual Assistance.
- Article 102 of the Capuchin Constitutions states that:

"All the brothers shall take to heart the need to show a true brotherly attitude toward the members of the Secular Order. By their own example let them nourish fidelity to the gospel life and effectively promote the Order itself among the secular clergy and the laity. The brothers shall willingly provide spiritual assistance to this Order."

- That fraternity Spiritual Assistants are members of the Council of the fraternity?
- That even if you are not in a parish or a house that has a fraternity, you can be a SA to a fraternity near you?
- That we need you to be with us and we want you to be with us!





FROM MY **HEART** I TELL YOU:

Your presence with a local fraternity or at a regional gathering is always appreciated even if for a half hour.

You are the living examples of the Franciscan charism among us-just as we Secular Franciscans hopefully bring inspiration to you.

We are sensitive to how busy and understaffed friaries are so we may not always bug you to be with us, but we want and need you to be with us.

We need your guidance with our Fraternity Councils.

We need your input on our candidates.

We need your input on initial formation.

We need your input on ongoing formation.

We need you to pray with us and for us.




