






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CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF THE APPROVAL OF THE 1978 RULE OF THE SECULAR FRANCISCAN ORDER







HAPPY NEW YEAR!

I HOPE YOU HAD A BLESSED CHRISTMAS AND BEGAN THE NEW YEAR WITH FAMILY AND FRIENDS.

At our Chapter of Ministers in November, I gave a "STATE OF THE REGION" report. Since there is so much important information in the report, I want to share it with all of you as we begin 2019.

Regional Statistics—As of March 2018, (We are now working on the update to these statistics. Your ministers will be submitting the new numbers by February 15, 2019.)

OUR LADY OF THE ANGELS REGION HAS:

- 30 fraternities
- 732 Active/Excused professed members (We have had 20 deaths since our last Chapter.)
- 79 Candidates; 23 in Orientation and 37 Inquirers We are very happy to see that the number of candidates is increasing. Many fraternities are getting visits from interested folks all the time. We have also had numerous recommendations through the National website.
- 69% of our members speak English; 22% Korean; 2% Spanish; 2% Polish; 5% Italian
- 24 Spiritual Assistants (6 fraternities have no Spiritual Assistant.) It is the local fraternity's responsibility to see if they can find a "suitable and well-prepared" spiritual assistant. Friars who are not in your parish, Franciscan Sisters, Clergy who are Secular Franciscans, other Deacons and diocesan clergy. If the person agrees his/her name is then submitted to the friar province to which the fraternity is bonded for appointment.

We do not have a Spiritual Assistant training program yet. It takes 2-3 years of study to become a SA. Although you cannot be a Spiritual Assistant for your own fraternity, we hope that if you feel called to be a Spiritual Assistant, you will let us know.

As you have heard at visitations, the hallmarks of good fraternity at all levels are: COMMUNICATION, COLLABORATION, COMMUNITY, COMMITMENT AND CONVERSION. These are all animated and nourished by our initial and ongoing formation and our fraternity prayer life. Our Lady of the Angels Region lives up to all of these and more!

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COMMUNITY AND COLLABORATION ALONG WITH FORMATION AND PRAYER

• Since November 2017, we have carried out <u>14 visitations</u>.

(Regional Executive Council members often accompany me.)

We also have attended other gatherings and celebrations when we are invited.

• Seven Elections have been carried out since November 2017. (Many of the elections were presided at by our dedicated REC members.)

Elections and Visitations for our 30 fraternities take place over a three-year period. Therefore, in 2019 and 2020 there will be 16 more visitations and 23 more elections.

During the State of the Region report, I reminded the ministers that, in fairness, when a member of the Regional Executive Council and a Regional Spiritual Assistant visit your fraternity or presides/witnesses at an election, the fraternity has a responsibility to cover the cost of travel, tolls and parking. Some fraternities have always done this. If more than one councilor attends, don't worry, they will submit their expenses to the region to be covered. If a fraternity cannot afford to cover these expenses, please just let us know, and the region will cover. Sometimes, fraternities who can afford to do so, give a "love offering" even if there are no travel expenses. This helps cover those fraternities that cannot afford a stipend.

WORKSHOPS

This year we had a CLUSTER INITIAL
FORMATION WORKSHOP ON VOCATION—
thank you to Ron Pihokker, our North Jersey
Councilor, and a SERVANT LEADERSHIP WORKSHOP—
thank you to Ed Wojciechowski and the
regional formation team, to Sr. Janice Jolin,
Spiritual Assistant to Holy Name Fraternity, and
Pat Spana, Minister of Little Portion Fraternity.
Both workshops were very well attended.
The Servant Leadership workshop had about
85 attending with representation from
almost every fraternity.

Thank you to Marie Palazzone and St. John Vianney-St. Elizabeth of Hungary fraternity for hosting. We also thank regional Manhattan Councilor Barbara Lyne, local minister Ester Lopez, and the fraternity at St. John's, NYC, who collaborated to rent vans for members from Manhattan to attend the gathering. Those who participated in presenting the panel discussions were excellent!

CONVIVENZA 2018

Held this year in Manhattan, our theme was Who We Say We Are; Communicating Who We Are; and Living Who We Are. Again, we had excellent attendance despite traffic and parking problems and the high expense of traveling into NYC. Thank you to the 31st Street Fraternities who hosted the day—particularly the ministers: Pat Clayton, Theresa Yun, Joseph Lee and Myriam Hart. Keep an eye out for the announcement of Convivenza 2019 to be held on March 23.

REGIONAL RETREAT

Nancy Conroy has continued working hard to develop a robust retreat team. We continue to invite our region members to help with programming and music. Please contact Nancy if you would like to be part of the team! This year (August 2-4, 2019) we will have Sr. Margaret Carney as our speaker. 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ASSISTANCE

is offered to local fraternities by various councilors—our Councilors are stepping up more and more. Please note that we are willing to meet with councils and formation teams at times outside of visitations. We are also willing to help local fraternities with ongoing formation, initial formation and vocations.

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COLLABORATION AND COMMUNITY ALONG WITH FORMATION AND PRAYER (OUR LADY OF THE ANGELS PARTICIPATES IN FRATERNITY OUTSIDE OF OUR REGION)

In April, I was honored to be invited to give a formation workshop to local formation directors in Five Franciscan Martyrs Region in Florida. The information presented was very well received.

In August, Ed Wojciechowski, Bro. Lombardo and I attended the National Formation Visioning Workshop; and Fr. Frank and Bro. Lombardo both attended the National Spiritual Assistants workshop. Both were held in St. Louis, MO. You will be hearing much more about the Visioning and the follow-up workshop both in *The Troubadour* and the *TAU*.

ALSO, IN AUGUST, right after the Visioning Workshop, the National Executive Council asked if I would serve as Chair of the National Formation Commission. Through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit I said yes. I hope that my experiences on the National Level will not only be good for the National Fraternity, but will have an important effect on our Regional fraternity.

IN OCTOBER, I attended the National Chapter in St. Louis, MO. Our Region serves as an example of excellent practices for sharing on the National level. The National Executive Council is very grateful to our Korean members for always being willing to help with translations.

Our Vice Minister, Richard Spana, was nominated for the position of National Treasurer. Although he was not elected (*whew*), he made an excellent showing in the number of votes received for someone who was not known nationally.

As National Formation chair, I will also be serving as a non-voting member of the National Executive Council and on the board of the Duns Scotus Trust Fund.



OR THE PAST SEVERAL MONTHS, I HAVE BEEN USING MATERIAL FROM THE F.U.N. MANUAL TO TEACH OUR PROFESSED MEMBERS OF THE ST. JOHN VIANNEY/ST. ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY FRATERNITY IN

The main focus for these classes has been "The Church" and the "Identity of the lay person." These classes have led to some

very healthy discussions among the members of the fraternity in understanding the meaning of the title of this article. What is Lay Spirituality, and why should we even bother to think about it?

Too often, the term "spirituality" has been restricted in our minds to ordained and religious vocations. However, the F.U.N. Manual is very clear in underscoring the importance of a Lay Spirituality as a way to discern where God is leading each of you. To be a follower of St. Francis prompts you to go further in your prayer experience through meditation and spiritual reading. This is why the vocation of the lay person has taken on new meaning.

Then, today I discovered an article on my computer written by a brother friar, Daniel P. Horan, for National Catholic Reporter

entitled, "Why should anyone care about Thomas Merton today?" December 10, 2018, marked the 50th anniversary of his untimely death. In this article, Dan outlines three reasons why the life and writings of Thomas Merton are important for us today.

"First of all, Merton was one of the first Roman Catholic religious leaders before the Second Vatican Council to emphasize the importance of prayer and contemplation for all people and not just the religious 'professionals' (i.e., nuns and priests). More than a decade later, the Second Vatican Council highlighted this same point by speaking about 'the Universal Call to holiness."

Secondly, Merton tied the importance of prayer to social justice. In his mind, both these areas are interrelated. Sadly though, for too many Catholics today, recognizing their equal importance has been a struggle at best, and irrelevant at worse.

And finally, Dan states that he believes the most significant reason why people should care about Merton today is his unabashed humanity. People can see how imperfect he was while, at the same time, he was a man seeking to find God in his daily life.

As we begin a New Year, I invite all of you to rediscover your own lay spirituality, perhaps by reading Merton's book, "Seeds of Contemplation."

I would also encourage you to consider finding a spiritual director for yourself. Such a person can be a wonderful companion who could help guide you on your spiritual journey.

I pray that this New Year will be especially inspiring for you as Brothers and Sisters of Penance.

JUSTICE, PEACE AND THE INTEGRITY OF CREATION

INCE THE FORMATION OF THE COMMITTEE, THE TEAM HAS BEEN FOCUSED ON **BUILDING AWARENESS AND HIGHLIGHTING THE WORK THAT IS GOING ON ACROSS** THE REGION IN JUSTICE, PEACE AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION INITIATIVES.

AT CONVIVENZA 2018, we presented "Living Who We Say We Are" which focused on the many apostolates our local fraternities support. Organizations like

- Operation Chillout,
- Several Sources Shelters,
- Birthright International,
- North Jersey Interfaith Cares and • Mychal's Message to name a few.

We convened a panel to discuss the work we are doing with Operation Chillout, North Jersey Interfaith Cares and a YouTube channel, It's Your World, created by Dawn Rusinko, of, Minister of Our Lady of Guadalupe (formerly Cortesia) fraternity,

We have apostolates that are engaged in initiatives dealing with respect for life and human dignity, immigration,

gun control, climate, hunger, prison ministry, international and domestic missions and implementing Laudato Si.

Collaborating with the Franciscan Action Network. (FAN), St. Benedict the Moor fraternity participates in a Franciscan Solidarity Table (FST). The Franciscan Solidarity Table is a concept rooted in scripture. It is an invitation to come to the table and sit with one another by building relationships, facilitating the encounter with those in the margins, and responding to the cry of those in the margins through charity and social justice.

In the Summer/Fall 2018 issue of The Troubadour. we highlighted the great work that the St. Louis fraternity is doing. Their fundraising efforts, to name just one of

their many missions, raised enough money to construct over 20 clean water wells in Zambia. They have helped the Franciscan Sisters from the Pentecostal Peace Village with donations to support young children and teenagers in orphanages in Ecuador. They visit the Green Haven Correctional facility in upstate New York and meet with Korean American prisoners.

Also featured in *The Troubadour* was the Trash to Treasure program at St. Mary of the Assumption fraternity. They collected over 50 pounds of pop top tabs which Ronald McDonald House converts to cash that helps support the "house that love built" a temporary home away from home for families of seriously ill or injured children being treated at nearby hospitals.

PIC COMMISSION

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Most Holy Name fraternity works with North Jersey Interfaith Cares, a charity whose current focus is on aiding refugees of the Syrian Civil War who have been relocated to our area. In October, Jim Andreano, ofs, from Most Holy Name fraternity and President of North Jersey Interfaith Cares presented at a Franciscan Federation sponsored event titled "Immigration/ Refugees: A Franciscan Perspective."

There is much more great work going on across the region supporting Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation. The Committee's goal for 2018 was to create a road show and generate awareness to get our fraternities interested and active in the issues that are important to fostering Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation. While we did not get to all the local fraternities, we learned that many were already doing good works and meeting the immediate needs of our less fortunate sisters and brothers locally and abroad.

What we need to do is a better job of promoting what our fraternities are doing so other fraternities can either be inspired to form an apostolate or support one of the existing fraternity apostolates in the region. Don't be paralyzed by trying to figure out how to help. Ask another fraternity active in JPIC issues how you can help them!

For 2019, we will continue to promote what our fraternities are doing. Everything I wrote about so far was focused on the "Charitable" Works" foot of the Two Feet of Love In Action campaign developed by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB).

It is clear that we do much better with that foot than we do with the "Foot of Social Justice." We are not as comfortable working to address the root causes of problems facing our communities by advocating for just public policies and helping to change the social structures that contribute to suffering and injustice at home and abroad.

In 2019, the Committee will explore being politically active. The Secular Franciscan Constitutions call us "to be in the forefront ... in the field of public life" and "collaborate as much as possible for the passage of just laws." We will explore initiatives sponsored by the Franciscan Action Network, Franciscans International, the Franciscan Federation and the Catholic Climate Covenant and others that come to our attention. Our voices will be heard. There will be much more to come with updates provided in future issues of The Troubadour and other means of outreach.

My heartfelt thanks to the Committee ofs' members: Jim Andreano, Kelly Moltzen, Ed Johnson, Kate Asselin, Jody Pihokker, Siobhan O'Dwyer and Agnes Czaplinski – for their dedication, sacrifice and commitment to helping those less fortunate.

National Visionin Workshop

his past Labor Day weekend, I had the honor and privilege of representing our region at the National Visioning Workshop in Kansas City, Kansas.

The workshop was attended by regional Formation Directors from each of the regions in the United States as far away as Hawaii and Guam! The regional Spiritual Assistants also attended the workshop, including our own Fr. Frank and Br. Lombardo. Along with Diane Menditto, OFS, who serves as Chairperson on the national formation commission, our region was well represented at the workshop!

One of the highlights of the workshop was a presentation given by Fr. Dave Pivonka on the role of

Franciscans to engage and transform the world. I'd like to share with you some of the highlights of Fr. Dave's presentation at the workshop in this article.



We, as Franciscans, must constantly transform ourselves so that we can transform the world through the Gospel.

In living our Rule, we "observe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by following the example of St. Francis of Assisi" and

devote ourselves "to a careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life, and life to gospel." (OFS Rule, Article 4). We conform our "thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel calls conversion." (OFS Rule, Article 7).

Our world has changed much over the past two decades. Today, we live in a world that lacks safety and is bombarded 24 hours a day with negativity on the news.

Many of the boundaries previously present in our society have disappeared. People are consumed with satisfying their own self needs often at the expense of others, especially the poor and marginalized. Many people have rejected God as the center of all that is good and true. We must recognize that this is the world that we live in and must engage on a daily basis.

So, how do we, as Franciscans, engage this culture? Fr. Dave said that we must not separate ourselves from this culture and from the world as this is anti-Christian. As Franciscans, we do not isolate ourselves in cloisters because the world is our cloister. We must remember that Christianity has always been counter-cultural and was never meant to be at the center of power in the world. Instead, we must infiltrate and transform the world.

This is what Jesus and Francis did during their lifetime and it is what we must do today.

FORMATION

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Francis lived a life of holiness and so must we. He stood in contradiction to his age. He rejected a life of comfort and privilege and chose instead to conform his life to the gospels. Jesus animated Francis as he totally abandoned his will to God. When we say that we are followers of Francis, it means that we abandon our will in our life to make room for God's will in our life. An encounter with Jesus, and a personal loving relationship with Him, is the basis of our faith. As such, the goal of all Franciscan formation is to have an encounter with Christ, to recognize Him, and to serve Him in the poor and marginalized of our society.

The Gospels have the power to transform our lives and to experience Jesus. The surest sign of the presence of Jesus in our life and our fraternity is joy. Jesus is at the center of all we do and we experience Him in the places where the world says nothing good can be found. As Franciscans, we embrace the lepers in our society and serve those who otherwise would be rejected and abandoned. We welcome strangers and provide them with food, shelter and a place to rest. We see all creation, both animate and inanimate, as brother and sister and strive to live in harmony with the natural world. This is how we infiltrate and engage the world. This is how we transform the world so that the Kingdom of God may be present in the world today.

ne Saturday evening, Marie Palazzone, Minister of the Saint John Vianney/Saint Elizabeth of Hungary Secular Franciscan Fraternity received a telephone call from Patricia Comerford. Patricia had found Marie's name on the Saint Bonaventure website. She said that her husband had recently passed away and told Marie that her husband was a former basketball coach who knew many of the friars. Patricia related that among her husband's belongings she found a box which contained an envelope which read, Third Order of Saint Francis. She told Marie the box and its contents should belong to the Secular Franciscan community. Patricia brought the box to the church office for the fraternity.

When Marie received the box she was grateful for it contained a relic of Saint Charles of Sezze. Marie brought the relic to the fraternity meeting where Reverend Frank McHugh, OFM, blessed it. The fraternity is truly privileged to have this relic where members can venerate and ask for intercessions at every meeting.

SO WHO WAS SAINT CHARLES OF SEZZE

Charles was born to a poor, Italian family on October 22, 1613. His grandmother helped raise him. She had a tremendous devotion to the Catholic faith and because of her example and teachings, Charles acquired a great love of God and prayer. Although he attended school, his studies were not very successful. When he finished, he went to work in the fields. He enjoyed this work and especially the oxen. During these early years, he received the sacraments frequently and prayed often. When he was seventeen, he made a vow of chastity; reading often of the lives of Saints, he gained a desire to imitate them. When he was twenty years old, he became seriously ill, near death, and promised to join the Order of Friars Minor if he was healed. True to his vow, two years later Charles received his habit.

His visible piety had increased so much that his older brothers wanted to follow his example. Charles asked to be sent to serve in the missions in India, but was unable as he suffered from poor health. On May 19, 1636, Charles made his solemn profession. His parents wanted him to become a priest, but Charles never requested ordination. He worked in varied positions; a sacristan, a gardener, beggar, porter and a cook. He wasn't great at any of those jobs and even once set the kitchen of a house on fire.

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From 1640-1642, he lived in the convent of Saint John the Baptist at Piglio and at San Francesco at Castel Gandolfo. During Mass at San Giuseppe Church, as the precious Host was elevated, a beam of light pierced his side and he was left with an open wound. God gave Charles insight into many things that are divine and truths of religion that even the most learned theologians were astounded. Many of them consulted him on the most difficult questions. Pope Clement IX and Cardinals even asked Charles for advice. He wrote several books including, The Grandeurs of the Mercies of God. In 1656 he cared for the needs of people sick with cholera at Carpineto. In 1664, he was taken to San Francesco a Ripa to recuperate from malaria where he recovered.

On July 28, 1665, he had a vision of Pope Saint Victor and Saint Teresa of Avila. In December of 1669, Pope Clement IX, on his deathbed requested a blessing from Charles, but the friar himself was gravely ill, so Charles was brought to the pope on a chair. Charles asked Cardinal Giacomo Rospigliosi to bless the Pope with a special relic the Cardinal had brought, but the Pope wanted the frail friar to confer the blessing. The Pope died December 9, 1669.

By December 31, Charles was bed ridden with pleurisy, and died on January 6, 1670 in the convent attached to San Francesco a Ripa Church in Rome where he is buried. Pope Leo XII pronounced him blessed in 1882, and he was canonized a saint by Pope St. John XXIII on April 12, 1959.

Prior to his death, Charles predicted that Innocent X and Alexander VII and Clement IX would be elected as popes. He had also predicted Cardinal Emilio Altieri would be elected pope.

Charles believed that Saints are not born saints. He believed that God chooses the humble to do His work and if they respond to this divine grace, and reverently trust in His providence, that is their path to sainthood.



ETTER ON THE OCCASION OF THE FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PROMULGATION OF THE OFS RULE





Circular letter of the Conference of General Ministers of the Franciscan First Order and Third Order Regular to all the friars and the brothers and sisters of the Secular Franciscan Order (OFS) and Franciscan Youth (YouFra) on the occasion of the fortieth anniversary of the promulgation of the OFS Rule.

Dear sisters and brothers, may the Lord give you peace!

1. FORTY YEARS: A SYMBOLIC PERIOD

On June 24, 1978, the Holy See approved the renewed Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order with the publication of the apostolic letter, Seraphicus Patriarcha. It was the recently canonized Pope St. Paul VI, himself a postulant Franciscan tertiary in his youth, who gave this gift to the Franciscan family just a few weeks before his death. Forty years have passed since the promulgation, and this anniversary seems to us a fitting occasion to address to you this celebratory letter. As is well known, in the Bible the number forty is charged with symbolic meaning; the span of forty years is first of all a generation and also seems to be the time for mature decisions. Therefore, this seems an opportune moment to thank the Lord for all that the sisters and brothers of the OFS are already living and to give new encouragement to their presence, which is invaluable for the whole Franciscan family.

2. THE SFO IN THE FRANCISCAN FAMILY

"The Seraphic Patriarch Saint Francis of Assisi, during his life and even after his beautiful death, not only attracted many to serve God in the religious family founded by him but also drew numerous members of the laity to enter his communities while remaining in the world as far as possible." Thus the beginning of the apostolic letter of Pope St. Paul VI, issued in 1978, recalls how various lifestyles of Christian discipleship in the Church emerged from the experience of St. Francis. "Among the spiritual families raised up by the Holy Spirit in the Church (cf. Lumen gentium 43). the Franciscan family unites all the members of the People of God: laity, religious, and priests, all of whom recognize the call to Christian discipleship in the footprints of St. Francis of Assisi. (Pope Venerable Pius XII, Speech to Tertiaries I, 1.7.1956).

In different ways and forms, but in a living and mutual communion, they aim to make present their common charism of the Seraphic Father in the life and mission of the Church." (cf. Apostolicam Actuositatem 4,8; OFS Rule I, n. 1)

It would seem that the possibility of serving the Lord fully in every state of life was already in the intuition of Francis. Thus, in some sense he anticipated the wisdom that every Christian in the Church is called to holiness, that wisdom that Vatican II emphasized strongly and Pope Francis has recently recalled in his apostolic exhortation Gaudete et exsultate: "Strengthened by so many and such great means of salvation, all the faithful, whatever their condition or state, are called by the Lord - each in his or her own way - to that perfect holiness by which the Father himself is perfect." (n. 10, quoting Lumen gentium 11)

In fact, the Franciscan Third Order (today, the Secular Franciscan Order,) has been enriched in its history by many figures of holiness; it is enough to think of Angela of Foligno, Bridget of Sweden, Catherine of Genoa, Elizabeth of Hungary, Gianna Beretta Molla, John Bosco, John XIII, Giuseppe Moscati, King Louis IX of France, Margaret of Cortona, Pius X, and Thomas More, just to name a few of the most noted saints.

To all of the saints and blesseds is added the most recent, Veronica Antal, beatified on September 22, 2018. With this "marvelous and varied flourishing" of Franciscan holiness" (collect for the feast of All Franciscan Saints), the Franciscan Third Order has truly shown itself indispensable for the full expression of our charism.

3. THE CHALLENGES OF TODAY AND THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH

The challenges facing the Church of today are many and complex. However, the time in which we live is also certainly a kairos, a time of special grace in which it is possible to experience a "new chapter of evangelization," as Pope Francis invites us to do in his apostolic exhortation Evangelii Gaudium: "In all the baptized, from first to last, the sanctifying power of the Spirit is at work, impelling us to evangelization. ... In virtue of their baptism, all the members of the People of God have become missionary disciples (cf. Mt 28:19). All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization." (119-120) As Franciscans, we see ourselves as particularly in harmony with the invitation of the Pope to live as a Church that goes out toward the geographic and existential peripheries of the world, so full of divisions, injustices, and sufferings. We are called to help build a universal evangelical fraternity, to work for the care of creation and for peace and justice, with a special consideration for the poorest and most needy, after the example of our Seraphic Father Francis, who "was particularly concerned for God's creation and for the poor and outcast. ... He shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace." (Laudato Si' 10) Such an complex and demanding task requires a proactive and effective collaboration, as well as visible communion, among the members of the Franciscan family. In our time, the contribution to this collaboration of the brothers and sisters of the Secular Franciscan Order is a particularly urgent necessity.

4. A MUTUAL CARE

Collaboration and communion among the members of the Franciscan family, today more than ever, must express itself in a reciprocity of care and mutual enrichment. "In Church Communion the states of life by being ordered one to the other are thus bound together among themselves. [...] They are different yet complementary, in the sense that each of them has a basic and unmistakable character which sets each apart, while at the same time each of them is seen in relation to the other and placed at each other's service. (Pope St. John Paul II, Christifideles laici, 55; italics original)

On the one hand, the Church has entrusted to the friars of the First Order and TOR the spiritual and pastoral care of the OFS, as is recalled in the Rule: "As a concrete sign of communion and co-responsibility, the councils on various levels, in keeping with the constitutions, shall ask for suitable and well prepared religious for spiritual assistance. They should make this request to the superiors of the four religious Franciscan families, to whom the Secular Fraternity has been united for centuries."

(OFS Rule, chapter III, n. 26)

On the other hand, those belonging to the OFS are called to express the secular aspect of the Franciscan charism, which is what characterizes their spirituality and apostolic life, living fully their specific call, supporting also by their prayer and action the vocation of the friars with whom they share the charism.

5. CONCLUSION

Dear sisters and brothers, on this fortieth anniversary of the approval of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order, we invite you to thank the Lord for the gift of our common Franciscan vocation and to renew your apostolic zeal that each might live his or her own mission in a creative way.

For our part we ask for all of you an abundance of divine blessings through the intercession of the our Seraphic Father St. Francis and the Blessed Virgin Mary, Queen of the Franciscan family.

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St. Conrad of Parzham, OFM 1818-1894



T. CONRAD SPENT MOST OF HIS LIFE AS PORTER IN ALTOETTING, BAVARIA, LETTING PEOPLE INTO THE FRIARY AND INDIRECTLY ENCOURAGING THEM TO LET GOD INTO THEIR LIVES.

Conrad was not a founder of an order, a priest or a doctor yet his love of God and his devotion to Mary made him a hero of Christ. Conrad excelled in the virtue of Charity, showing itself in love of God and neighbor, devotion to the Holy Eucharist and a childlike confidence in Mary, the Mother of God. Conrad received a good training in Catholicism from his parents whom he helped on the farm. We are told that he spent many hours in prayer while going about his work, so it may not be surprising that this holy youth sought entry to the Capuchins after attending a mission in his town.

He entered as a humble lay brother. In his notes we find written, "The Cross is my book." Because Christ had given all to us, Conrad decided to give all he could possibly give for Christ and souls. He held the office of Porter at Altoetting for over forty years. As the monastery was a place of pilgrimage, it was besieged by a thousand calls a day. To young and old alike, to polite and impolite, the saint was kind and gentle.

By living in union with God, he was able to let Christ act through him. In answering questions and discussing God, he led many souls to the Divine Redeemer. Conrad ate little. slept less, and worked hard, but always in communion with Christ, the God of his heart. He had a great longing for the Eucharist and served Mass with great devotion. The Mass was the greatest joy of Conrad's long and hard life. Whatever extra time he had from his work, the Saint spent before the Blessed Sacrament.

To the strong devotion to the Eucharist and the Crucified Lord, Conrad added a special devotion to Mary. She was his Queen and Advocate in all his trials and above all his guide to Christ. He prayed before the statue of Our Lady of Sorrows and the Crucifix in the Porter's Office and was always ready to spread devotion to Mary by the distribution of Rosary Beads.

Brother Conrad spent 41 years at his post at the door, attending to this job with great tact and attention. Indeed, he was known for his patience and respect for others, humility, and piety; he was always willing to assist others and never lazy. No one ever saw him in a bad mood or heard him utter a useless word. He became a silent preacher, who infused respect in the visitors, converted sinners, consoled the afflicted and helped the poor.

Once he wrote to a friend: "My life is to love God, suffer, and marvel in ecstasies and

prayers about the love God has for us, poor creatures. His love never ends. There is nothing in my occupations that separates me from this union with God. My book is the Cross. It suffices for me to look at it to know what I should do."

Conrad served his last Mass on April 18, 1894; he resigned his office of porter, three days later, while the children whom he had taught the Rosary, recited it outside his window, Conrad died.

His heroic virtues and the miracles he performed, won for him the distinction to be ranked among the Blessed, by Pope Pius XI, in the year 1930.

Four years later, the same Pope, approving additional miracles, which had been performed, solemnly inscribed his name in the list of Saints.

The ever-patient Conrad was canonized in 1934. The feast of St. Conrad is celebrated on April 21.

t is notable that most members of our fraternity are from the St. Joseph of the Palisades parish in West New York, New Jersey, where we serve as Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors and visit sick parishioners. Our devotions include praying the Rosary, the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. I lead the Divine Mercy Prayer Group of St. Joseph and organize trips to the Shrine of the Divine Mercy in Massachusetts.


In 2016, after the July 6 election of a new council, we were designated as the first Spanish speaking fraternity of the Our Lady of the Angels Region. Today our fraternity is standing strong and growing. We attribute this to the fact that many people are praying for us, for our perseverance, and for the guidance and blessings of the Holy Spirit.

All the members of our fraternity are just ordinary people, but we share an extraordinary will towards serving others in need, in following the steps of St. Francis of Assisi and the Scriptures as our way of life.

San Conrado de Pazham, OFM 1818-

an Conrado pasó la mayor parte de su vida como portero en Altötting, Baviera, dejando entrar a la gente al convento y alentar indirectamente a dejar a Dios en sus vidas.

Conrado no era un fundador de una orden, un sacerdote o un médico, sin embargo, su amor a Dios y su devoción a María en un héroe de Cristo hizo. Conrado destacó en la virtud de la caridad, que muestra en el amor de Dios y del prójimo, la devoción a la Sagrada Eucaristía y una confianza filial en María, la Madre de Dios. Conrado recibió una buena formación en el catolicismo de sus padres, a quienes ayudó en la granja. Se dice que pasó muchas horas en oración mientras que va sobre su trabajo, por lo que no puede sorprender que este joven santo solicita la entrada de los Capuchinos, después de asistir a una misión en su ciudad.



El entró como hermano lego humilde. En sus notas encontramos escrito: "La cruz es mi libro." Debido a que Cristo había dado todo a nosotros, Conrad decidió dar todo lo que podía dar a Cristo ya las almas.

Ocupó el cargo de Porter en Altoetting durante más de 40 años. A medida que el monasterio era un lugar de peregrinación, fue sitiada por miles de llamadas al día. Para jóvenes y adultos, que educado y maleducado, el santo era amable y gentil. Al vivir en unión con Dios, fue capaz de dejar que Cristo actúa a través de él. Al responder preguntas y discutir Dios, llevó a muchas almas a lo Divino Redentor.

Conrad comía poco, dormía menos, y trabajó duro, pero siempre en comunión con Cristo, el Dios de su corazón. Tenía un gran deseo de la Eucaristía y sirve misa con gran devoción. La misa fue la mayor alegría de la larga y dura vida de Conrad.

Sea cual sea el tiempo extra que tenía de su trabajo, el santo pasó ante el Santísimo Sacramento.

Para la gran devoción a la Eucaristía y el Señor Crucificado, Conrado añadió una especial devoción a María. Ella era su reina y Abogado en todos sus ensayos y, sobre todo, a su guía a Cristo. Él oró ante la imagen de Nuestra Señora de los Dolores y el crucifijo en la Oficina del Porter y siempre estaba dispuesto a difundir la devoción a María por la distribución de Rosarios.

Hermano Conrado pasó 41 años en su puesto en la puerta, la atención a este trabajo con mucho tacto y atención. De hecho, era conocido por su paciencia y respeto por los demás, la humildad y la piedad, sino que siempre estaba dispuesto a ayudar a los demás y nunca perezoso. Nadie lo vio de mal humor o le oyó pronunciar una palabra inútil. Se convirtió en un predicador en silencio, que infunde respeto en los visitantes, convierten los pecadores, consolaba a los afligidos y ayudó a los pobres.

Una vez le escribió a un amigo:

"Mi vida es amar a Dios, sufrir y maravillarse en éxtasis y plegarias sobre el amor que Dios tiene para nosotros, pobres criaturas.

Su amor no se acaba nunca. No hay nada en mis ocupaciones que me separa de la unión con Dios. Mi libro es la Cruz. Es suficiente para mí verlo para saber lo que debo hacer ".

Conrado sirvió su última misa el 18 de abril 1894, renunció a su cargo de portero, tres días más tarde, mientras que los que le había enseñado el Rosario, recitado fuera de su ventana, Conrad murió.

Sus virtudes heroicas y los milagros que realizó, le ganaron la distinción que se encuentra entre la Virgen, por el Papa Pío XI, en el año 1930.

Cuatro años después, el mismo Papa, que aprueba milagros adicionales, que se había realizado, solemnemente inscribió su nombre en la lista de los Santos.

El siempre paciente Conrad fue canonizado en 1934.

La fiesta de San Conrado se celebra el 21 de abril.



STAGES OF CANONIZATION IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

Servant of God \rightarrow Venerable \rightarrow Blessed \rightarrow Saint

Secular Franciscan proclaimed Venerable by the Pope

orn in Pisa to bourgeois parents, in 1874 at the age of 25, he decided to devote his life to the poor and soon discovered the charism of St. Francis of Assisi. He felt that Francis' guidelines in his Rule were things that he could do in Pisa as his true calling and so decided to join the Secular Franciscan Order. He vested in their habit on 7 Dec. 1907, and his profession on 8 Dec. 1908. He also began working for the Saint Vincent de Paul Society based in Pisa in 1894.


Lodovico served as a teacher and educated children who had been abandoned and or neglected. He never married and lived in Pisa with his priest brother. Lionello, and his two sisters, Teresina and Rosina.

He visited prisons and frequented those places in order to reach out to the prisoners and bring them a message of hope as well as to teach them the messages contained in the Gospel while attempting to emulate the merciful love of Jesus Christ.

Coccapani was devoted to the Eucharist and was an ardent devotee of the Blessed Mother. His confessor and close friend was the Cardinal Carlo Rossi (future Servant of God) and he had also met and worked with Blessed Giuseppe Toniolo. He was also close with Cardinal Pietro Maffi who invested Coccapani with the civil class honor of the Knight of the Pontifical Order of San Gregorio Magno.

In 1914, he became President of the Pisan detail of the Vicentian Conference and carried out the duties of the organization during World War I; it was during that conflict that Lodovico took care of war orphans.

He died at his home in Pisa. the evening of 14 Nov. 1931, due to the pneumonia he had contracted earlier that week. He was given a simple funeral and buried in a simple grave which followed the instructions he had laid out in his will, and also stipulated that his home (now a museum) was to become a kindergarten.



Cause for Sainthood continues

In the Pisan parish of Saint Francis, a Poor Person's kitchen. named MENSA DEI POVERI, was dedicated to him following his death, where it continues to serve people in need.

His influence

became widespread in Pisa and the surrounding areas to the point where he earned the moniker of the "Knight of God."

The canonization process commenced in 1949 in Pisa he therefore became titled as a Servant of God - and lasted until 1966 at which point the cause became blocked. It remained in that inactive state until 1989 when the Archbishop of Pisa Alessandro Plotti had it reopened. The cause continued due to this new impetus and was closed on 15 November 1996.

On 28 Jan. 1997, the Congregation for the Causes of Saints granted their formal approval to the cause with the "nihil obstat" (nothing against) declaration and around that time issued a decree validating the diocesan process. The next step in the cause was to compile the Positio dossier for the C.C.S. to evaluate whether Coccapani exercised a life of heroic virtue or not.



FATHER,

you wanted to make Lodovico Coccapani an apostle of charity, generously spending his whole life in helping the neediest brothers.

His remains were exhumed in December 2015, and placed back into his grave after an examination and canonical inspection was completed.

THE 2017 ANNUAL REPORT REPORTED THE MENSA DEI **POVERI** is managed by the friars of San Francesco in Pisa. Together with Caritas, it reported that in the course of 2017, the kitchen was open 275 days. The attendance of the guests amounted to 9,317. Of these, 8,036 were lunches, while 1,281

people took food baskets home. About 60 volunteers are involved weekly in the food production. The kitchen begins its food service from mid-September to 30 June (every day). The Mensa of the Parish of San Francesco di Pisa is named after Servant of God, Lodovico Coccapani, who lived in the Via

Berlinghieri. Every last Sunday of the month, in conjunction with the Saturday Vigil Mass and the 3 Sunday Masses, the "Festival of the Cakes" has been organized for years by people from the Mensa of the Parish, and is a means to self-finance the Mensa.
