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Merry Christmas!

The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord (Luke 2:10-11).

I'm writing this in early December so I am still in Advent mode, hopefully waiting for the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ. I will switch gears for a moment to celebrate the Incarnation.

Would Jesus have come if man had not sinned? The short answer is Yes. The Trinity always knew that one of them would become one of us. Or, as we say in the Creed, "born of the Father before all ages." Scotus argued that the reason for the Incarnation is Love. The Incarnation in Scotus becomes the unrepeatable, unique, and single defining act of God's love.

If man had not sinned Christ would still have come, since this was predetermined from all eternity as the manifestation of God's love for the creation he brings about in his free act. Jesus is plan A, not plan B. The Incarnation in Franciscan spirituality is centered on love and not sin. So, does God redeem us from sin because he loves us? No, says Scotus. God loves us and then redeems us. Redemption is an act of love first and foremost, not an act of saving us from sin, and the first act of redemption is the Incarnation. God foresees us in union with him before he sees how sin disrupts that relational dynamic between He and us (Fr. Seamus Mulholland, OFM).


The most important thing in the world is that God is madly in love with us, according to +Archbishop Daniel Pilarczyk (Diocese of Cincinnati 1982-2009). There is no reason for it, God just loves us. That's why there is a world. That's why each of us is here. God loves us so much that he wanted to be one of us! In Jesus, God became a human being not just to tell us who and what God is but also to show us who and what we are supposed to be. What the Incarnation shows us is not primarily the need for redemption, but the need that is in each of us for love. Scotus begins with Love, that love which is the very being of God himself. He begins with love in the Incarnation and He ends with love on the Cross.

Fr. Seamus reminds us that if God willed the Incarnation from all eternity, then it was always his intention to become part of sinful creation. Sin determines the manner of that becoming, but it does not determine the fact that it was going to be.

I wish you, your families and fraternities a very Merry Christmas and a blessed year in 2025 as we celebrate the Jubilee Year of Hope (see my other article on the Jubilee year).

Good and faithful servant, you have done what was yours to do. Please pray that we will always do what is ours.



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The Centenary of the Canticle of the Creatures (2025)

The Franciscan Centenary is a multi-year celebration of the 800th anniversary of the key events in the life of St Francis. It is divided into four centenaries over four years reflecting on the Rule and Christmas in Greccio (1223-2023), the gift of the Stigmata (1224-2024), the Canticle of the Creatures (1225-2025), and the Easter of Francis of Assisi (1226-2026). St. Francis understood that everything he had was a gift of God's love. His journey started at San Damiano with listening to God's command to "rebuild my church" and ended with him receiving the stigmata on Mount La Verna. He joyfully accepted God's gifts and chose to return them to the world.

Pope Francis, in his Letter on the Centenary Celebrations, encourages all Franciscans to recognize "the right paths you must follow in order to correspond boldly and faithfully to the charism you have received." He encourages us to use the Centenary as a "time of inner rebirth, of a renewed missionary mandate for the Church which calls you to go out to meet the world where many brothers and sisters are waiting to be consoled, loved and cared for." In response to the Pope's letter, Franciscans celebrate these five centenaries as one family united in love and harmony..

Why did Francis write the Canticle?

St. Francis was nearly blind when he wrote the Canticle of the Creatures. Despite this, he viewed creation with gratitude and saw the presence of the Creator in everything. To him, all of creatures are siblings because they are created by God. He believed all creation formed a choir that endlessly praises God, who gives generously. He invites all creation, Brother Sun, Sister Moon, Brother Fire, Sister Water, along with Sister Mother Earth and her fruits and flowers to praise their Creator. The Canticle reflects Francis' life journey of growing closer to Christ and expresses his faith in God as a loving and caring Father. Reflecting on the Canticle

"Praised be You, my Lord, with all Your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun, Who is the day and through whom You give us light. And he is beautiful and radiant with great splendor; and bears a likeness of You, Most High One." As Franciscans celebrate the anniversary of the Canticle, we are encouraged to examine our attitudes and how we relate to creation. We need to move from exploiting nature to caring for our common home.

We should consider how we interact with creation. Do we act as rulers who exploit nature? Are we consumers taking what we need? Or are we brothers and sisters who appreciate and protect creation?

These questions pose a significant challenge that could affect our future and that of our planet.

The Canticle opens our eyes so that we can nurture and protect creation. However, caring for the environment requires us to care for our hearts as well. We need true change that is both ecological and spiritual. Only with open hearts, can we replace hatred with forgiveness and promote reconciliation and harmony. Our Rule instructs us to "respect all creatures, animate and inanimate, which bear the imprint of the Most High", and motivates us to "strive to move from the temptation of exploiting creation to the Franciscan concept of universal kinship." (OFS Rule, Article 18).

But how can we best live the Rules every day of our lives? Franciscans are encouraged to develop a prayerful and contemplative outlook on creation that is able to recognize the presence and beauty of our Creator. We need to deepen our awareness that we all share the same home and must care for it. We also need to grow in the awareness that the human environment and the natural environment can work together in harmony and enrich each other.

With these challenges in mind, I encourage everyone to study the Canticle and reflect on how we can meet the challenges of protecting and nurturing our common home. We need to live our Rule and protect the beautiful gift of creation given to us by our Lord. We may not be able to solve all ecological problems, but we can be an active voice to change the world in the spirit of St Francis.

Are You Being Called to Bring JPIC to Life?

"I have done what was mine to do" is a phrase commonly attributed to Saint Francis of Assisi, signifying that he has fulfilled his own responsibilities and that now it is time for others to embark on their unique journeys. This phrase is often interpreted as a profound call to action, urging individuals to continue the vital work he initiated by dedicating their lives to faith and service for others. The advancement of Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) stands as a fundamental aspect of our Franciscan calling. It is not only a principle but, ideally, something that each of us should strive to embody and live out every single day in our interactions and choices.

What exactly is the role of a JPIC Animator?

First, let's talk about what it is not.

- It is not somebody who has to do everything.
- It is not even somebody who WANTS to do everything. In a well-functioning Fraternity, nobody has the right to do everything, even if they want to!
- Nor is it an easy way for the Minister to put a check mark in a box, allowing the rest of the Fraternity to proceed with business as usual.

Now let's talk about what the role does entail. In the simplest sense, it is exactly what the name implies.

To animate. To bring to life.

It's more than just being a Coordinator, although that's certainly part of it.

It's even more than being a Servant-Leader, although that's part of it as well. It involves lighting a fire within the minds and hearts of fellow Fraternity members. Or more specifically, to nurture the fire which is already smoldering, to varying degrees, within each member.

What does it take to fill this role?

- The first and most obvious prerequisite the fire must first be burning within you! You must have a passion for the advancement of Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation.
- Must have the mindset that JPIC is an integral part of your vocation, and not an optional extra.
- Must be willing to share that belief with your fellow Fraternity members.
- Must have Administrative and Servant-Leadership skills - but not necessarily on Day One! These can be learned and developed. Your Minister and Fraternity Council will help.
- Full profession is not required, a Candidate may serve in this role.
- Must be mindful and respectful of the diversity of opinions and beliefs of your members.

SO... is there a chance for you to engage in what it is that you are truly meant to do? Is it possible that the important and meaningful role of JPIC Animator could indeed be a significant part of your unique Franciscan calling?

If your answer is "Maybe," I encourage you to consider discussing this matter further with your Minister for more clarity and guidance. There is a very good chance that in your Fraternity, this role is currently vacant, just waiting for you to step up and fill it! 
Celebrating the feast of our Seraphic Father

Jubilee Year 2025 – Pilgrims of Hope

A Jubilee is proclaimed through an official papal "Bull of Indiction". The "Bull" is generally written in Latin and bears the seal of the Pope. But why is it called the "Bull"? The term "bull" (from the Latin bulla, round object) originally indicated the metal capsule used to protect the wax seal affixed to a papal document of particular importance, to attest its authenticity and therefore authority. Over the centuries, the term was used to indicate first the seal, then the document itself.

Each Jubilee "Bull" is identified by its initial words. For example, Saint John Paul II proclaimed the Great Jubilee of the Year 2000 with the Bull Incarnationis Mysterium: The Mystery of the Incarnation. Pope Francis proclaimed the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy in 2015 with the Bull Misericordiae vultus: The face of mercy.

Pope Francis proclaimed SPES NON CONFUNDIT. "Hope does not disappoint" (Rom 5:5) for the Jubilee Year of 2025. He continued, "In the spirit of hope, the Apostle Paul addressed these words of encouragement to the Christian community of Rome. Hope is also the central message of the coming Jubilee that, in accordance with an ancient tradition, the Pope proclaims every twenty-five years. My thoughts turn to all those pilgrims of hope who will travel to Rome in order to experience the Holy Year and to all those others who, though unable to visit the City of the Apostles Peter and Paul, will celebrate it in their local Churches. For everyone, may the Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the "door" (cf. Jn 10:7.9) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as "our hope" (1 Tim 1:1).

Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. Even so, uncertainty about the future may at times give rise to conflicting feelings, ranging from confident trust to apprehensiveness, from serenity to anxiety, from firm conviction to hesitation and doubt. Often we come across people who are discouraged, pessimistic and cynical about the future, as if nothing could possibly bring them happiness. For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope. God's word helps us find reasons for that hope. Taking it as our guide, let us return to the message that the Apostle Paul wished to communicate to the Christians of Rome."

CIOFS General Chapter 2024 Theme: You Are Love



Dear Brothers and Sisters:

As I write this, I am on my way home from the General Chapter of the Secular Franciscan Order held in Rome from November 9-17th.

The General Chapter, a gathering of the Ministers or the international councilors from all 70 national fraternities from around the world, takes place every three years. In one triennium an elective Chapter is held. The other is devoted to general business.

This year's Chapter was for general business, and it was especially important business since the new Statute of our Order was voted on and passed. The Statute, which will affect all of us in many ways, was issued "ad experimentum" in 2021. The entire Order had a chance to discuss, comment on, and live it since then. An official signed copy in English will be available soon and will be posted on the national website.

The delegates also voted on the priorities for CIOFS, the worldwide Order, for the next three years. These are: **Formation, Family Life, and Vocations**. These priorities, along with the Chapter theme, **"You are Love,"** will surely influence every national, regional, and local fraternity.

The USA was well represented this year. In addition to our International Councilor, Mary Frances Charsky, OFS, who represented us as a voting member, National Formation Chair Layna Maher, OFS, and I attended as observers.

Each day was filled with business, working group discussions, reports of various committees, and reports on projects happening around the world. Peacemaking, education, and environmental issues were some of the main projects.

Each morning, we began with a mass in one of the 4 CIOFS languages (Italian, English, Spanish or French.) The masses were celebrated by each of the General Ministers of the orders to which we are bonded, OFM, OFM Capuchin, OFM Conventual, and TOR (Third Order Regular). Music was provided by young adult councilors serving YouFra international.

In the evenings, each region, North America, South America, Europe 1 and 2, English-speaking Africa, French-speaking Africa, and Asia/Oceania presented entertainment and treats from their countries. For the USA, we led the group in singing the **Canticle of the Sun.** In between each verse, we gave fun facts about the USA translated into English, Spanish, and Italian. Then, everyone joined us in singing the refrain in English.

Our Presidency works very hard to serve the International Order. Because of their excellent planning, we were able to meet our brothers and sisters from around the world and found that we share many of the same concerns and desires. The desire for good formation and knowledge of resources is similar all over the world. They are working for us just as we on the Council of OFS-USA are working hard for you!

Of course, all of you were in our prayers and in the prayers of all who attended.

Inspirational SAINTS BL. ANGELA OF FOLIGNO



(1248 – January 4, 1309) FEAST DAY: January 7

"Without humility of heart all the other virtues by which one runs toward God seem - and are - absolutely worthless." Angela of Foligno

Third Order Regular. Widow

After leading a sinful life, even as wife and mother, Angela was converted in 1285. Following the death of her husband, her children and her mother, she became a Franciscan tertiary in Foligno and established a community of Sisters of the Third Order Regular. Directed by the friar, Arnold of Foligno, she was endowed with great mystical gifts. Her spirituality is strongly centered in Christ, leading to union with the Most Holy Trinity. Her writings, translated into Latin by Friar Arnold, have been praised by St. Francis de Sales, St. Alphonsus Ligouri and Pope Benedict XIV. She was beatified in 1693.

Reflection (Franciscan Media)

People who live in the United States today can understand Saint Angela's temptation to increase her sense of self-worth by accumulating money, fame or power. Striving to possess more and more, she became more and more self-centered. When she realized she was priceless because she was created and loved by God, she became very penitential and very charitable to the poor. What had seemed foolish early in her life now became very important. The path of self-emptying she followed is the path all holy men and women must follow. The liturgical feast of Saint Angela of Foligno is celebrated on January 7.
