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LETTER FROM OUR REGIONAL MINISTER NAFRA CHAPTER 2015

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

As our region hosted the National Elective Chapter, you were all very much on my mind. I want to thank each and every one of you for your prayers and good wishes for the success of the Chapter and our efforts to welcome the National Fraternity to the New Jersey-New York area.

Those of you who were instrumental in helping everything to run smoothly during the ten days we were in Clinton have a good idea of what went on in the planning and execution of our task. However, since there are many who could not be with us, I would like to give you an idea of why I am so grateful for what was accomplished with God's help. As you probably know, Ron Pihokker was the chair of the **Host Committee** which met a number of times throughout the last year. He also handled two huge jobs: site selection and registration. Representatives from most of our fraternities attended the planning meetings and were kind enough to volunteer for various important assignments.

The main committees were: **Transportation/Airport Welcome** (Chair-Frank Catalano – with Maddi Romaine); **Welcome/Hotel Greeters**-(Chair-Pat Franz); **Half-Day Away**-(Chair-Kate Asselin); **Liturgy**-(Chair-Joe Wilson); **Welcome Bags**-(Chairs-Italia Testa & Rosanna Ayers); **Entertainment**-(Chair-Joe Lee); **Financial**: Richard Spana; **Notes and lists**: Kate Asselin.

However, telling you the names of the committees cannot begin to describe the team effort, personal sacrifice and generosity that went into this weeklong event. Our brothers and sisters of the **Transportation Committee/Airport Welcome Committee** spent hours at the airport holding beautiful signs provided by the Manhattan Cluster. They greeted, gathered and guided those who arrived at the various terminals, either to the curb to be picked up by our drivers who made many trips from the airport to Clinton, or to the van pick-up point. This was not just one day-people were coming and going all week and at all hours! Oh, and by the way, our treasurer, Richard Spana, was also present for the entire week, many days he was stationed at that same table to take care of any of the financial transactions that had to be carried out.

At 9:30 AM on the morning before the National Executive Council arrived, this committee appeared at the hotel, their cars filled with the snacks, notebooks, pens (VERY popular), water bottles, hand sanitizer and the beautiful welcome bags—all provided by St. Anthony of Padua Fraternity and the Central Jersey Cluster. Within an hour and a half, the bags were filled and lined up in the meeting room like soldiers waiting to be deployed. Everyone loved those bags; I kept hearing it all week. If you got to go to Clinton, you saw that we had a Chapel set up in a small ballroom. Thanks to the Liturgy Committee, we had everything we needed to make it a REAL chapel-even a tabernacle (thanks, Sam!) with the Blessed Sacrament reserved. Just imagine hauling vestments, altar linens, altar vessels, a monstrance, wine, hosts, crosses, a full-size keyboard and amplifier, icons of Francis and Clare, plants, flowers, vases, pumpkins, and missalettes. An SUV and a pick-up truck were involved in that two-day operation! The Chapel décor was topped off by the banner designed and guilted by Mary-Frances Reavey which served as the logo of the entire Chapter. The musicians and the music were wonderful too. At the opening Mass, we were blessed to have as main celebrant Msgr. William Benwell who is Vicar of the Diocese of Metuchen and Spiritual Assistant to St. Anthony of Padua Fraternity.

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UPCOMING EVENTS

2016 QUINQUENNIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The fund provides full and partial scholarships to the 2016 Quinquennial for professed and/or candidates of a fraternity who would otherwise be unable to attend. The monies for these scholarships come from the Restricted Funds for National Events and Regional Needs Fund (originally set up from a bequest received in 2011). Up to \$10,000 has been approved by the NEC for this purpose. Request for assistance from this fund should be made to the National Treasurer, Jerry Rousseau, OFS. All requests must be made utilizing the Application form. Information will be kept confidential.

Ideally, the local fraternity or Regional fraternity should also provide assistance for their members to attend. That is one of the inherent purposes of the "Common Fund" which should exist in every local fraternity. Applicants should present the form to their local minister/leader for verification that a true need exists and that no other source of revenue is available for use by the applicant. Please note: Scholarship funds can only be used for registration costs and not to defray travel or other expenses.

Once approval has been obtained, the applicant will submit their registration form either with a notation that a full scholarship has been awarded or that payment for the difference of registration costs minus the approved scholarship amount is enclosed; e.g., the cost of registration \$320(a), minus approved scholarship amount of \$120(b), equals payment of \$200(c). [a minus b = c]

Applicants must also have made hotel reservations and have a room confirmed (or have secured other accommodations). No requests for scholarships will be accepted after the application deadline, **March 31, 2016**. We pray that these funds will allow more of our brothers and sisters to attend the 2016 "Q" and serve as a blessing to all of us.

SPIRITUAL TIDINGS

REAWAKENING

September 24, 2015, Pope Francis became the first pontiff in history to give an address to the United States Congress. As he was delivering his kerygma, (for it truly was a proclamation) I was busy going about a neighborhood reading water meters for the Nyack Water Department. I came to one house where a fellow quickly allowed me entry and as I proceeded to go directly to his basement to check his meter he says to me: "Hey! If you have a minute you should check this out. This guy is great!" As it turns out, he was listening to the Pope's address to the Congress on his cell phone. "What he is saying is great! And I'm not even a Catholic!" So, I sat with my new found friend and listened with him. It really was a special moment. There we were, two strangers and yet realizing a brotherhood between us and a shared vocation that connects us with other people and the created world in which we live. Thomas Merton's rather dark but accurate description of his entry into this world is one that describes all of us:

"I came into the world. Free by nature, in the image of God, I was nevertheless the prisoner of my own violence and my own selfishness, in the image of the world into which I was born. That world was a picture of Hell, full of men like myself, loving God, and yet hating him; born to love him, living instead in fear of hopeless self-contradictory hungers".

This truly resonated with me and my new found brother, but we were not left to wallow in the mire. The Pope, using the example of Moses, Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Dorothy Day and Merton also spoke of the transcendent dignity of the human being and that "each son or daughter of a given country has a mission, a personal and social responsibility...in the tireless and demanding pursuit of the common good".

Since that memorable morning listening to the Pope's words in someone else's kitchen l've reflected on what I heard. Where have I heard it before?

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God...You are the salt of the earth...You are the light of the world...Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" *Matthew 5*.

I also took a renewed interest in the beautiful words found in *Gaudium et Spes,* otherwise known as the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World.

In this document we read:

"The joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the people of our time, especially of those who are poor or afflicted, are the joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the followers of Christ as well. Nothing that is genuinely human fails to find an echo in their hearts"...

"It is the human person that is to be saved, human society which must be renewed. It is the human person, therefore, which is the key to this discussion, each individual human person in her or his totality, body and soul, heart and conscience, mind and will" ... "Deep within their consciences men and women discover a law which they have not laid upon themselves and which they must obey. Its voice, ever calling them to love and to do what is good and to avoid evil, tells them inwardly at the right moment: do this, shun that. For they have in their hearts a law inscribed by God. Their dignity rests in observing this law, and by it they shall be judged. Conscience is the most secret core and sanctuary of the human person. There they are alone with God whose voice echoes in his depths. By conscience, in a wonderful way, that law is made known which is fulfilled in the love of God and of one's neighbor".

The Pope's message to Congress reawakens Jesus' sermon that pronounced the Beatitudes for us: it reawakens the "kerygma" found within the documents of the Second Vatican Council, especially *Gaudium et Spes*.

And finally, for me, at any rate, it reawakens my own mission statement that one of my sisters challenged me with at my ordination:

"Comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable!"

"Have Mercy on me, God, in Your kindness.In Your compassion blot out my offense.O wash me more and more from my guilt and cleanse me from my sin."

Psalm 51:1-4

Every Friday morning, Secular Franciscans start our day with Morning Prayer asking for God's mercy and forgiveness using the beautiful words of Psalm 51.

Through our lives of witness to the Gospel, Jesus has revealed to us a loving and merciful Father who is "slow to anger and rich in mercy". In response to the Gospel message of mercy, our *Rule* instructs us to love God and our brothers and sisters,

"Witnessing to the good yet to come and obligated to acquire purity of heart because of the vocation they have embraced, they should set themselves free to love God and their brothers and sisters. " Rule Chapter 2, Paragraph 12

It is in the spirit of the Gospel that we rejoice in the celebration of the Jubilee Year of Mercy! On March 13, 2015, Pope Francis announced the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy with the Papal Bull "Misericordiæ Vultus". The Jubilee Year began on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception on December 8, 2015, and will end on the Solemnity of Christ the King, on November 20, 2016. The Jubilee Year will give us many opportunities to celebrate the love and mercy that God has bestowed upon us and to share God's mercy with our families, our fraternities and everyone we meet on our faith journey.

We have all experienced the love and mercy of God in our lives. Pope Francis teaches us that "the mercy of God is His loving concern for each one of us" and that God "desires our well-being and He wants to see us happy, full of joy, and peaceful." (*Misericordia Vultus, paragraph 2*). These teachings are also reflected in Psalm 51 when we ask God to give us joy and keep alive the spirit of mercy in our lives:

> "Give me again the joy of Your help; with a spirit of fervor sustain me." Psalm 51:14

The Jubilee Year of Mercy will give us the opportunity to contemplate the mystery of God's mercy and to open our hearts to God's eternal love for us in spite of our failings and shortcomings. God's mercy has been revealed to us in the cross and resurrection through which Jesus became the perfect sacrifice for our sins. It is in the spirit of renewal that we seek God's mercy through the sacraments so that "we may become a more effective sign of the Father's action in our lives." (Pope Francis)

We can celebrate the Jubilee Year through prayer, the sacrament of reconciliation and formation. 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In addition to the resources on the Internet, there are many other excellent resources available in print. Some books that I find useful for either private reflection or as part of your fraternity's ongoing formation program are "The Holy Year of Mercy - A Faith Sharing Guide with Reflections by Pope Francis" published by The Word Among Us Press, "The Saints in Mercy" published by Our Sunday Visitor and "The Church of Mercy" published by Loyola Press. This is not an extensive list of resources for the Jubilee Year and there are many other excellent books available for prayer and formation. If you find a resource that you think is useful, please contact me and I will update the regional formation resource list so that others in the region may benefit from your experience.

Since it is the wish of Pope Francis that the "faith of every believer may be strengthened" during the Jubilee Year, the Regional Executive Council has chosen Chapter 6, "Listen to the Cry of the Poor" from "The Church of Mercy" as part of our ongoing Council formation program. I urge all Secular Franciscans to join with the Regional Council in celebrating the Jubilee Year through prayer, regular celebration of the sacraments (especially the sacrament of reconciliation) and formation. In this way, we will join with the entire Catholic Church in becoming "a credible witness to mercy, professing it and living it as the core of the revelation of Jesus Christ. " Misericordia Vultus. paragraph 25.

New York Korean Martyrs Fraternity was founded in October 1990 when eight professed members (three from Argentina and five from Korea) knocked on the doors of St Francis of Assisi church in Manhattan. Fr. James Nero, OFM, the abbot of St. Francis of Assisi church, Fr. Matthew Gaskin, OFM, and Fr. Venant Lalonde, OFM were the ones who opened the door and began the forming group. For the members who had a language barrier, Fr. James Nero introduced us to Franciscan Brother, Francis Ki Soo Kim. Since then he has been with us as Spiritual Assistant. Four years later on December 4th, 1994, we were established as the Korean Martyrs Fraternity. Starting from the eight members, we steadily grew to 149 members with 120 active members.

On our 20th Anniversary on December 2014, we celebrated our most senior members in appreciation for laying the foundations of our fraternity. The greatest influence has come from our spiritual assistant, Fr. Francis Ki Soo Kim, OFM. He is an exemplary faithful Franciscan who always emphasizes that the spirit of St. Francis is flowing amongst us.

Each month, we hold two regular meetings. On the first Sunday, we have a general fraternity meeting consisting of the Liturgy of Hours, fraternity announcements, initial formation (three levels) and ongoing formation by the formation director, lectures by the spiritual assistant, and end with Mass.

On the second or third weekend, we have eleven local group meetings consisting of the Liturgy of Hours, studying the Rule and General Constitution, faith sharing, community service sharing, care of the sick provided by the members, and ask suggestions for the ministries council and participation in funeral services.

FRATERNITY SPOTLIGHT

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We also have activity groups. There is the formation committee. The prayer committee visits the sick, elderly, and homebound members. Another prayer committee prays for the deceased members and their families and performs funeral services. Twenty-one members have passed away since our fraternity has been formed. When a fraternity member passes away, we participate in the procession of the funeral with the family members in fraternal love.

To study St. Francis' spirituality and to help grow member's faith, we have retreats twice a year. We made a pilgrimage to

Assisi with five other Korean Fraternities. We have workshops every three years, including all the Korean Franciscan fraternities from Canada to Argentina, and participate in the Quinquennial Meeting as part of the Franciscan Fraternity.

At this year's NAFRA Chapter meeting, Korean Martyrs Fraternity introduced the Korean culture through traditional music and dance performances.

Our fraternity also actively participates in apostolic activities for St. Francis Care

Center. We have held 10 bazaars and 1 concert to raise funds for 40 lonely and homeless sisters who are over 65 years old in order for them to obtain housing and to overcome their difficulties.

We also participate in the annual bazaar at St. Francis of Assisi Church in the Korean community to raise more funds for the homeless. Some of our sponsoring organizations are St. Francis of Assisi Church, St. Missionary Charity, the Maryknoll Brothers, Sungsimwon in Korea, Manna Foundation in Russia, and Franciscans International at the UN.

We also try to protect all creation by reducing the use of disposable supplies and products, conserving water, and garbage separation since 2008 with the "Green & Clean" campaign.



Since the end of 2012, we have been devoting prayer of St. Francis Rosario and plan to do so until 2017, which is the 100th anniversary of the Marian apparitions in Fatima. We dedicate our prayers for our native country, who faces the pain of national division. We pray to God that St. Frances and St. Clare's peace spread to the whole world through our fraternity members. And as The Korean Martyr Fraternity, we will strive to make the 103 saints and 124 beautified Korean martyrs proud by our continued devotion. N.Y. Korean Martyrs Fraternity, Fighting!!

Lenora was a public advocate and tireless worker for the homeless and most vulnerable. She proudly carried her Franciscan Tau and drove her almost vintage auto, whose signs spoke loudly for great causes of our time: Peace, Justice, Equality. Her environmental concerns were rooted in Franciscan joy, Francis' celebration of God's creation.

This joy was seen in her Clown Ministry as Karen Petersen, OFS, recalls Lenore decorating her face and arms for the Parish Fair.

Joe Borowski, OFS, said that in her Jesters of Clown Ministry she always delighted in making folks laugh at St Anne's events and in the nursing home dressed as a clown. She influenced our own Father Colin Kay who for ten years used the clown ministry to perfection for religious feasts. She founded and co-directed St. Anne's Youth Group and to some, became a 2nd mother and mentor. She launched the St. Anne's Food Pantry which fed hundreds of families in Bergen and Passaic Counties. The Bergen County Council of Churches recognized her tireless work on behalf of the homeless.

She was forthright with a courage that engaged others of faith in

urage that engaged others of faith in her work serving as a vocal member of the Inter-Religious Fellowship. Lenore received the Archdiocese of Newark prestigious *Caritas Award*. *The Bergen County Association of Churches* recognized her tireless work on behalf of the homeless. Lenore had over a dozen books of photos and articles as testimony to years of work.

St. Anne's had scheduled a tribute reception in her honor; and they held iteven though Lenore had passed on to the Lord days before. Her funeral Mass was attended by religious leaders of diverse faiths.

Anthony Marinelli, OFS, was a good friend and staff member with Lenore for many years. He said that,

"Lenore feared no one and spoke up when she had to. She had a heart of gold and would give you the shirt off her back. But you could not pull her leg (we say); she knew when someone was fibbing, or trying to pull a fast one-- know you could not get away with it, not with Lenore."

"She loved Thanksgiving season, the time for everyone to get together, we Catholics, our Protestant and Jewish brothers and sisters at another Church or Temple."

"Each year she helped organized a community Seder. She would have many meetings with all the heads of different rite Christians at our Church rectory now and then. They all loved Lenore, how could you not. Lenore loved it when women achieved better positions in the Church. One of Lenore's most adored women, a Servant of God, was Dorothy Day, whose picture hung before her office. Lenore was a Franciscan all the way. "DEAREST LENORE PRAY FOR US!" Love you." --Anthony Marinelli, OFS

Deacon William Joyce, OFS, says "Lenore professed her lifelong commitment to the Secular Franciscan Order on January 25- 1998. She lived that profession for the rest of her time on earth. At one event, I told her I was not given purposely towards acting like a clown-- I'm clowning enough by accident. Lenore ignored my protestations and dressed me in a rainbow wig and a red nose. She had me join the clown troupe at Maple Glen Manor in Fair Lawn as they entertained the residents. It was very funny, and a good lesson in Humility."

"Every spring she obtained flower seeds and the Fraternity passed them out to parishioners after the weekend Masses. At one September meeting, we packaged dog biscuits, cat treats, and even bird seed to distribute after Masses and on St. Francis Day."

"In 2014, Lenore was too ill to attend the Blessing of the Animals. Her husband, Alfred, who had been ill for many years with MS had died. When I visited her at the funeral home her first words were, "How did the Blessing of the Animals go?" Lenore was one of those people who knew what was needed to be done for the poor, for the animals and for the Earth. There was no negativity with her when her mind was made up. Sometimes we call people like that philosophers, sometimes poets; sometimes prophets, and sometimes saints. We will not see her like again. --Bill Joyce, OFS Lenore would not agree to her children's wishes to get her an air conditioner or a new car. Francis you recall, forbade the Friars to own a horse, a sign of wealth.

Lenore's vintage car covered with signs for peace and social justice surely received a disapproving look from some.

Didn't Francis receive some of the same?

Doesn't Lenore's photo with the picture of Pope Francis say so much?

Her expression and extended hands say so much. People have remarked about it. As Lenore looked at Pope Francis, may we brothers and sisters be able to look at Lenore and her example.

There was no doomsday for Lenore who seemed to be skipping in a dance of Franciscan joy in God's creativity.

Her prophetic life experienced the two sides of the Tau affliction and joy.

Lenora was a Troubadour for peace and all good!
