

LETTER FROM OUR REGIONAL MINISTER

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

It was wonderful to see so many of you at Convivenza! Our "family gathering" is always a highly anticipated and nourishing time for us as Secular Franciscans of Our Lady of the Angels Region. Thank you for making the effort to be present to your brothers and sisters.

This year during the months of May and June, many of your fraternities will be having a Fraternal and Pastoral Visitation. We already have twelve scheduled for this Spring alone! Those of you who have been Secular Franciscans for many years will have experienced a visitation or two, perhaps many more than two. Our newer members, however, might not have experienced this aspect of fraternity life. In any case, we all (myself included) can use a good review of the basics once in a while, so—

DID YOU KNOW

••• That the earliest Rules of our order, right up to the advent of the Rule of 1978 and the Constitutions of 1990 (updated in 2000 and 2001), required that the visitor be a friar alone?

(You can read about this in the Handbook for Spiritual Assistance–updated in 2012)

••• That our present day Rule in Article 26 and our Constitutions in Articles 92 and 94 give us important insight into the Fraternal and Pastoral Visit?

"The purpose of both the **pastoral and fraternal** visits is to **revive the evangelical Franciscan spirit**, to **assure fidelity** to the charism and to the Rule, to **offer help** to fraternity life, to **reinforce the bond** of the unity of the Order, and to promote its most effective insertion into the Franciscan family and the Church."

(Constitutions: Article 92-1)

"The fraternal visit is a moment of communion, an expression of the service and concrete interest of the secular leaders at the various levels, so that the fraternity may grow and be faithful to its vocation." (Article 94-1)

"Among the various initiatives to achieve the purpose of the visit, the visitor will give special attention:

- -to the validity of the formation, both initial and permanent;
 - -to the relations entertained with other fraternities at the different
 - levels, with Franciscan youth, and with the entire Franciscan family.
 - -to the **observance of the directives and of the guidelines** of the International Council of the OFS and of the other councils;

-to the presence in the local Church." (Article 94-2)

"The visitor will (also) **check the report of the previous audit** or verification of the financial and property management of the Council, the register of the accounts and every document pertaining to the property of the fraternity..."

(Article 94-3)

LETTER FROM OUR REGIONAL MINISTER continued

DID YOU KNOW

• • • That one of the duties of the fraternity minister at each level is "to request, with the consent of the council, the pastoral and fraternal visits, at least once every three years."?

(Article 51-2)

[The minister at each level makes the request to the council of the higher level.] We suggest that this request be made **every three years, 18 months after a new council is elected**. If we don't hear from your minister, we will contact him or her. We like to keep everyone up to date! (By the way, Ministers can request visits at other times if, in collaboration with the council, it is deemed necessary.)

• • • That your fraternity minister and council prepare ahead of time for the visitation?

We ask that the Minister and Council collaborate on filling out a Pre-visitation Questionnaire to be returned to me at least three weeks before the visitation. The questionnaire asks about everything mentioned above in Articles 94-2 and 3. We also send a check-list to help the Minister and Council know what to have ready for us. (You can read all of these forms on our region website on the Resources page, second column, half-way down:

That the visitors (Brother Doug and I-or on some occasions my delegate) will meet with your Council before we meet with the entire fraternity?
 At that time, we look at and sign the fraternity records, talk about the formation program and ask if the council would like us to help out with any aspect of your fraternity life. Very often, Vice Minister, Nancy Conroy, or one of the other councilors will accompany me. Brother Doug will also make special time to meet with your Spiritual Assistant.

. . . That after we meet with the council, we meet with the entire fraternity?

First, we will pray together. Our Ritual has special prayers for the Fraternal and Pastoral visit on page 50. You can pray and meditate on these ahead of time if you wish. Then we will have a little time for some ongoing formation. Last, BUT BY NO MEANS LEAST, it will be your turn to ask questions, express concerns and make any comments you would like us to take back to the Region Executive Council.

- • That your Minister and Council will receive a written report from me and Brother Doug with commendations, comments and suggestions for your fraternity? Ask to see it about two weeks after the visit!
- • That we look forward to our visits with local fraternities because you are our brothers and sisters and we love getting to know you better? Although we see many of you at Convivenza, the Chapter of Ministers, our retreat and at some of the Cluster gatherings, the visitation provides us with additional time to be with you in fraternity. We hope that you will find the Fraternal and Pastoral visit to be an uplifting time in your lives as Secular Franciscans!

Please know that I think of you often and pray for you every day. Please keep me and your Region Executive Council in your prayers.

While the Regional Executive Council has agreed to support Amazon Relief's Boat Project, it is hoped that our local fraternities will also consider contributing to this worthy effort.

Amazon Relief has been approved by the IRS as a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization.

Dear OFS Brothers and Sisters:

We have received a request, an offer, and an opportunity.

The Request — We have been asked if we could <u>fund the purchase of</u> <u>a boat</u> which would allow priests and missionary teams to serve 90 isolated communities located along a large, remote stretch of the Amazon River.

The Offer — One of our donors has offered to <u>match dollar for dollar</u> all donations given to purchase this boat.

The Opportunity — By giving missionaries the tools they need to carry out this ministry we <u>can be an integral part of carrying Christ's</u> <u>Good News to the ends of the</u> world.

A few details — Currently there is a priest and team of lay missionaries who try to serve these 90 communities. Transportation is, however, a constant and major problem. All travel must be done by boat, as there are no roads to these communities. There are commercial riverboats that carry passengers from time to time along the river, but there are several problems with these:

•There are hefty costs to transport missionary teams.

•Drop off and pick up times are irregular.

•As missionaries complete their work in a village, they cannot immediately move on to the next village (they must wait for another commercial boat to come up the river, and they can only take that boat when they have assurances that there will be another boat to bring them back).

• There are seasons of the year when the river is low and commercial boats cannot reach the communities.

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Many people assist in the work of Amazon Relief, both in the United States and in the Amazon.



Jim Flickinger, OFS, is the administrator of *Amazon Relief* in the United States. He and his wife, Lois, are Secular Franciscans residing in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Jim is a former Minister (1995-2001) of Our Mother of Sorrows Fraternity of the Secular Franciscan Order and has served as the Peace and Justice Commissioner for the Divine Mercy Regional Fraternity of the OFS. Jim is the recipient of many awards for his humanitarian work, including the National

Franciscan Peace Award in 2000.

The end result is that all of the communities are served irregularly, and many of the communities are rarely served.

We have spent the last several months determining what type of boat would work best for the missionary team, getting quotes for the purchase of the boat, and determining how ongoing operational costs will be paid. We are very satisfied as to the needs, benefits, and costs, and I am writing to ask for your help.

The boat will cost about \$50,000. It will transport and be able to sleep (in hammocks) up to 12 missionary team members. (The ability to sleep on the boat is very important, for most communities lack lodging for the missionaries).

Operational costs should be less than are currently being paid for commercial riverboat transportation, (and if costs exceed funds available, the Archdiocese will cover these).

What is also special about this is that

• There is a priest and a lay missionary <u>team in place</u> to travel and carry the Catholic faith to these 90 communities.

• The boat can be <u>used for decades</u>.

• And even more, the true benefit reaches beyond decades — the <u>benefits are eternal</u>, souls are at stake.

Our real investment is not in the boat; the boat is only a tool. Our real purpose is to allow the Good News to continue to be carried to the ends of the earth.

We would like to say "yes" to the request that has been made of us. The boat is needed, we can double every donation made, and it is a true opportunity to respond to Christ's Great Commission. Please help.

Everything you give will be used towards the purchase of this boat — and with this appeal <u>everything you give will be doubled.</u> As always, no part of your donation is used for administrative costs.

May is an exciting time of the year. The snowy days of Winter are gone and have been replaced by the warmer days of Spring.

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May is a time for First Holy Communions, graduations, weddings and for celebrating mothers.

It's also a time to honor the mother of our Lord. The Blessed Virgin Mary holds a special place in the lives of Secular Franciscans.

The OFS Rule describes Mary as a 'humble servant of the Lord, who was open to His every word and call.' (OFS Rule, Chapter 2, Article 8)

St. Francis declared Mary 'the protectress and advocate of his family.' (OFS Rule, Chapter 2, Article 8)

Also, we are reminded that Secular Franciscans should express their ardent love for her by imitating her complete self-giving and by praying earnestly and confidently. (OFS Rule, Chapter 2, Article 8)

One way that we can honor Mary in our individual and communal prayer life is by praying the Franciscan Crown Rosary. The Franciscan Crown Rosary, also known as the Seraphic Rosary, the Franciscan Crown, or the Rosary of the Seven Joys of Our Lady, recalls seven joyful events in the life of Mary: the Annunciation, the Visitation, the Nativity, the Presentation, the Finding in the Temple, the Resurrection and the Assumption. We meditate on each of these events when we pray the Franciscan Crown.

The Franciscan Crown consists of seven decades of Hail Mary's. Each decade is preceded by an Our Father. Unlike the Dominican Rosary, no Glory Be or any other prayers are said at the end of each decade. At the end of the seven decades, two additional Hail Mary's are prayed, bringing the total of Hail Mary's to 72, the number of years of Mary's life. The Franciscan Crown is concluded by praying one Our Father and one Hail Mary for the intentions of the Pope.

A few years ago, my fraternity began a new tradition to pray the Franciscan Crown at our May gathering. We have found that praying the Franciscan Crown as a community is a way for us to honor Mary as protectress of the Franciscan Family.

This May, I suggest that you take the time to pray the Franciscan Crown either individually or in community. Who knows, maybe you'll start a new tradition in your Fraternity, too!

In the course of this ministry, as the Bridges Outreach says, "stereotypes fade, understanding develops, caring overcomes indifference, a sense of purpose prevails and friendships are formed based on mutual respect."

Family Promise is an interfaith organization which houses temporarily homeless families

for up to 4 months at various churches of all denominations. The churches provide housing on a rotating schedule and families usually stay for one week at each location. Usually 3 to 5 families-up to 14 children and adults are given lodging.





Family Promise also offers a number

of support services to the families, including daycare, job training when needed, and assistance in finding permanent housing.

If anyone is interested in joining us in one of our ministries, they are very welcome.

Nearly 80% of the families served are able to find permanent housing.





She dedicated it to her loved ones—Mary, Jack, Levi and the OFS family; "thank you for your prayers and love. I feel the same as Michael Jackson when he talked about his work. 'I have nothing to do with it almost it's created in the universe. It's God's work, not mine.' He took responsibility to do his best because of his conviction. I can hope to do the same."

THE GOSPEL AS THE RULE OF LIFE **OF SAINT FRANCIS OF ASSIST**

Saint Francis of Assisi was a great follower of Jesus Christ. With all his heart, he yearned to live in accordance with the Gospel. The Gospel is of major importance in his vocation, which was not only evangelical, but also evangelizing. Poverty, chastity, and obedience, as well as emulating the Gospel faithfully, constituted the foundation of his life. Saint Francis was aware that Jesus Himself had revealed this way of life to him. He confesses it in his Testament:

"When the Lord gave me brothers, no one showed me what I should do, but the Most High Himself revealed to me that I should live according to the form of the Holy Gospel." (Testament)

In the Rule we read: "The Rule and life of the Friars Minor is this, namely, to observe the Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by living in obedience, without property, and in chastity." (Rule)

Saint Francis desired to live entirely according to the Gospel: therefore, he wanted to become as Christ-like as possible. He understood that to live by the Gospel means to follow the Savior. On February 24, 1208, during the Holy Mass at the church of the Angelic Mother of God (St. Mary of the Angels), Saint Francis heard the words of the Gospel penetrate deeply in his heart:



"... As you go, preach this message: The kingdom of heaven is near ... Do not take along any gold or silver or copper in your belts; take no bag for the journey, or extra tunic, or sandals or a staff ..." (Mt 10, 7-10).

Listening to the excerpt about the commissioning of the twelve apostles, when the Lord indicated how they were to go out to the whole world to spread the Word of God, Saint Francis deeply understood the purpose of his life – his vocation. He found these words to be his calling; he wanted to live according to the Gospel and to preach conversion and penance. The Gospel illuminated the path of his vocation. And so, Francis became an eager follower of the Gospel, by means of which the Son of God communicated with him. He saw the presence of Jesus Christ in the Gospel. The Gospel became his rule of life. For Saint Francis, cherishing the Gospel meant loving Jesus Christ, thus, listening to it means listening to the Savior.

Therefore, the Word of God should be a foundation of the spiritual life of Franciscans. One should consider it along with the Rule and other documents of the Order. The Saint used the words of the Savior in sermons and letters often.





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Francis showed us the ideal of living the life of penance and love through obedience to God. Following the Gospel completely formed the foundation of St. Francis's life. The first rule, approved orally by Pope Innocent III, consists of numerous fragments from the Gospel. The Saint used the words of the Savior in sermons and letters often.

Through the vow of profession, Franciscans respond to God's call, which means devoting oneself to serve Christ in a special way. Profession does not only join a person to Jesus, but similarly to baptism, it incorporates a man into the Roman Catholic Church even more closely. Franciscans should be eager in the service of spreading the Gospel, according to the example and charism of Saint Francis.

It is worth quoting the words of the Holy Father Pope Francis from the Apostolic Exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium*, which says,

"The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept His offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ, joy is constantly born anew. In this Exhortation, I wish to encourage the Christian faithful to embark upon a new chapter of evangelization marked by this joy, while pointing out new paths for the Church's journey in years to come."

A sacramental life is a characteristic aspect of Franciscan spirituality - the sacramental life which allows a person to live and ponder the living presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. It should be emphasized that Franciscan spirituality is evangelical spirituality. People choosing the Franciscan life should have two crucial objectives: an aspiration to Christian excellence and an apostolate – the acts of service which we are called to do by the Roman Catholic Church.

At present, as in past centuries, people all over the world are dedicating their lives in service to Jesus Christ, following the example of Saint Francis.

In order to fulfill the call, Franciscan communities should be, above all, schools of prayer and deliberation on the Word of God and ought to be based on love for God and people. It reveals itself through preaching Jesus Christ Risen Savior and through prayer for, and service to, the poorest people. Therefore, membership in the Franciscan community obliges us to follow Christian role models.


People seeking to follow Saint Francis's example in their lives should become models of Christian faith for today's world.

Franciscans must accept the great challenge of apostolate as part of the mission of the Roman Catholic Church, preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ by the example of their lives.

Saturday, March 14, 2015, St. Anne's Fraternity, in Fair Lawn, New Jersey, sponsored a Day of Recollection. Twenty intrepid souls braved threats of deluge to attend. Deacon Bill Joyce, OFS, (*above*) presented **"On Becoming a Saint."** He began with a reading from John 14:1-6. From all eternity, Jesus has prepared a place for each of us, for all of us, to be with Him in Heaven forever. He wants us to be with Him, forever. He wants us to be saints. Anyone who goes to Heaven is a saint. Jesus is God; God is infinite, and we humans are not. When Jesus told stories, His images were, of necessity, limited by what the human minds could absorb.

When Jesus spoke of Heaven, He spoke of a wedding feast, maybe even a king's wedding feast. That was the best party the first-century mind could comprehend. Heaven is better than that, but our understanding can only go so far.

Some people think that Catholics worship saints. That's not so; we worship *only God*, we venerate the saints. Some people say we have idols of the saints in our churches. Up until about two hundred years ago, more or less, most people were illiterate. The church taught about the saints with stories and images. Having statues, paintings, and stained glass windows of the saints was the same as having a family photo album, or today, a photo file. We see the pictures of family members and we tell stories about them. All saints are members of our Christian family who have reached the goal of this life — they've made it to Heaven.

The canonized saints are members of our Christian family who have reached the goal of this life - they've made it to Heaven, and whom the Church *formally declares* have made it to Heaven. They did what they were supposed to do in life, but did it to a heroic degree.

The proof the candidate is in Heaven is two miracles worked through his/her intercession; one miracle for beatification, occurring after the death of the candidate, bestows the title "Blessed" on the candidate. For martyrs, if the Pope issues a decree of martyrdom, the beatification miracle may be waived. A second miracle, subsequent to beatification, including martyrs, qualifies the candidate's enrollment on the list of saints.

WHAT'S A MIRACLE?

A miracle is a sense-perceptible suspension of the laws of nature. It's something that we can see and touch, that is not possible under the laws of science. For those who are not Franciscans, your path for holiness is for you to find, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Going to Heaven is kind of like going to New York City, there are lots of roads that will get you to the same place. We Franciscans believe that St. Francis' way is what works for **us**.

COULD A THIEF BECOME A SAINT? Dismas, the Good Thief, crucified alongside Christ, prayed,

"Lord, remember me when You come into Your Kingdom!" Jesus replied "Amen, I say to you, (you better pay attention), **this day** you will be with Me in paradise." Dismas is the only saint canonized by Christ Himself.

COULD A WOMAN WHO ABORTED ONE CHILD AND BORE ANOTHER OUT OF WEDLOCK BECOME A SAINT?

Dorothy Day, (1897-1980) was a Benedictine Oblate; suffragist, pacifist; baptized at age 30, on the Feast of the Holy Innocents. With Peter Maurin, she founded the Catholic Worker, based, in part, on the teachings of Francis of Assisi.

THE KEY IS REPENTANCE.

WHAT DO YOU DO IF YOU FIND YOURSELF FACING A MEDICAL PROCEDURE YOU'VE NEVER HAD BEFORE? You talk to people who've already had the procedure, so you'll have an idea of what to expect.

OR, WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN YOU FIND THAT YOU HAVE TO DRIVE DOWN TO FLORIDA?

You talk to someone who's driven to Florida, so you'll know what roads to take, where the speed traps are, and where to stop to eat or rest on your journey.

The end of our journey is Heaven; Jesus Himself told us that He has had our place there ready from all eternity. But to get to Heaven, we first have to pass through this life. Who better to guide us than the people who have already gotten through this life and are now in Heaven?

Our church has over 10,000 saints and blessed. That number includes over four hundred Franciscan saints, blessed, venerable, and servants of God. That's canonized saints and those whose causes for sainthood are well underway.

What each person in this very different group of human beings has in common with the others is that he/she loved God with all his heart, and all his soul, and all his mind, and all his strength.

Each saint followed the path that was right for her/him. May God show us our path.
